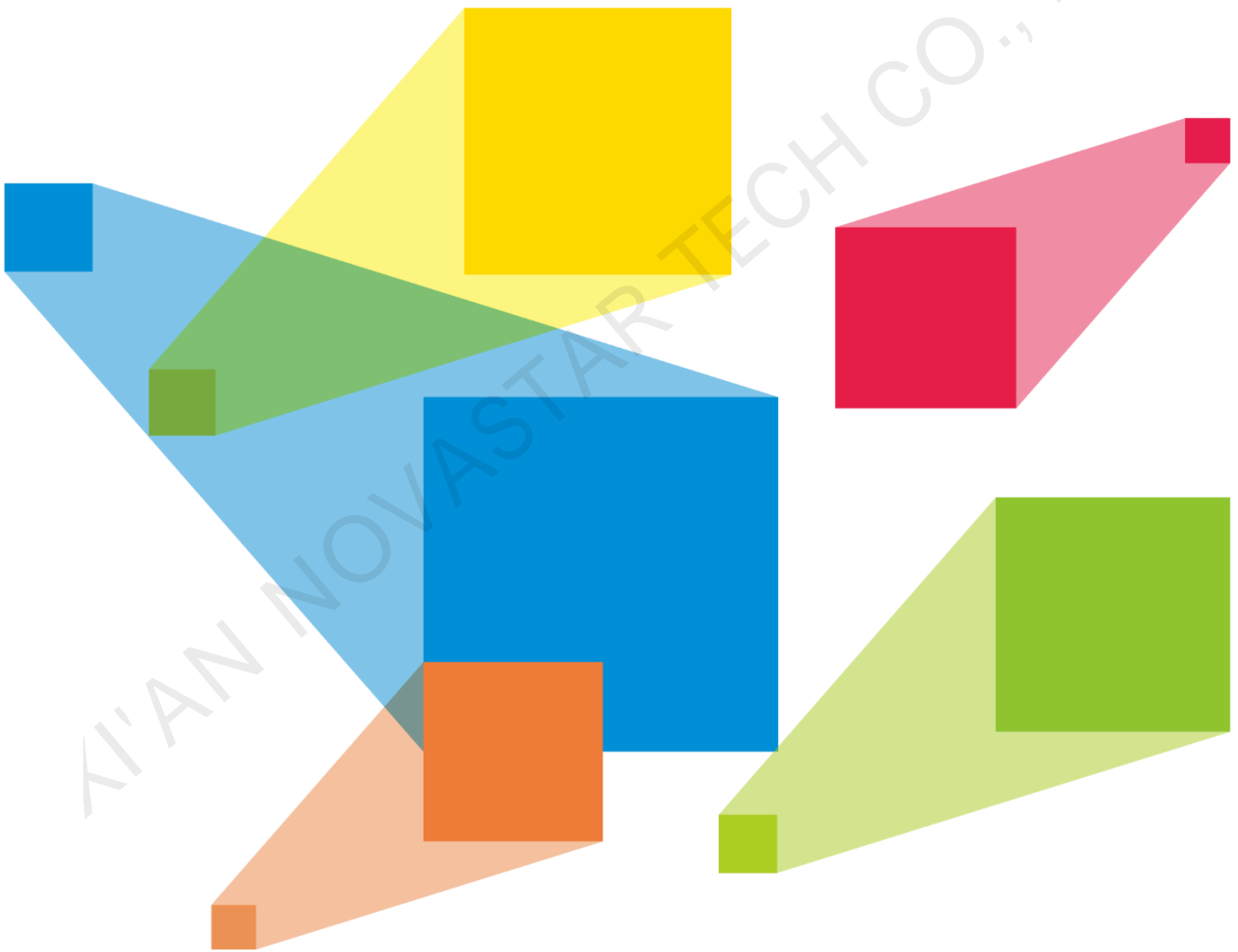

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# 1 Safety Instructions

## 1.1 Environmental Requirements

- Ensure adequate air flow in the equipment room.
- Take measures to prevent dust, water and static electricity.
- Avoid long-term direct sunlight.
- Do not place the equipment in a position near fire and heat.

# 2 Overview

The NovaPro UHD is a new all-in-one controller developed by NovaStar. By integrating video processing, video control and LED screen configuration functions into one controller, this product is capable of receiving a variety of video signals, processing and sending images of resolutions up to Ultra HD 4Kx2K@60Hz and 8Kx1K@60Hz, and drives up to 10,400,000 pixels.

With built-in Master VI smart platform, the NovaPro UHD supports layer creation, property settings, and screen configuration by simple mouse, keyboard and monitor operations.

The NovaPro UHD can send the processed video to LED display through Neutrik Ethernet ports and OPT ports. Thanks to the powerful video processing and sending capabilities, this product is well suited for high-end rental applications, stage control systems and fine-pitch LED displays.

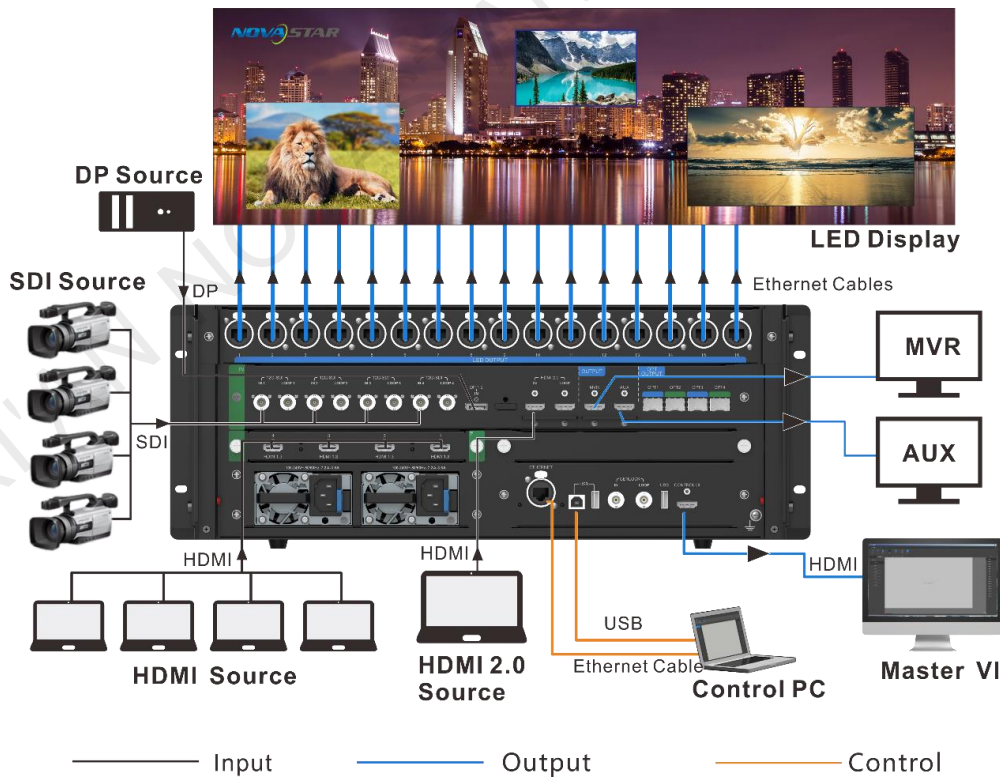

# 4 Applications



**Note:**

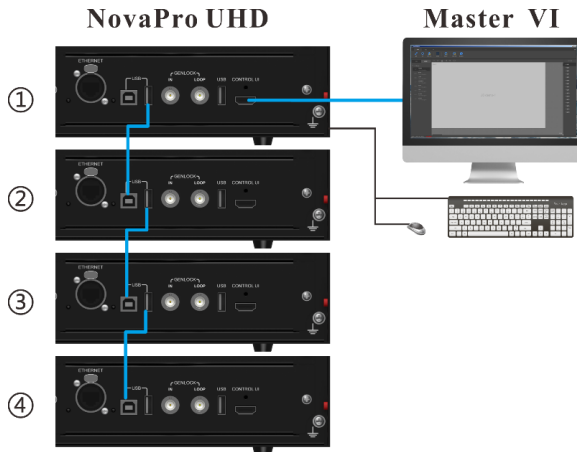
This product can be placed horizontally only. Do not mount vertically or upside-down.

The product can be mounted in a standard 19-inch rack capable of withstanding at least four times the total weight of the mounted equipment. Four M5 screws should be used to fix the product.

## Link Control

The NovaPro UHD allows for linking of at most 4 device units. In link control mode, when you connect a monitor, mouse and keyboard to any of the device units, you can control each device unit independently through Master VI.

## 5 Menu Operations

### Button Descriptions

#### Knob:

- On the home screen, press the knob to enter the main menu screen.
- On the main menu screen, rotate the knob to select a menu item, and press the knob to confirm the selection or enter the submenu.
- When a menu item with parameters is selected, rotate the knob to adjust the parameters. Please note that after adjustment, you need to press the knob again to confirm the adjustment.

#### ESC:

- Press the button to exit the current menu or cancel the operation.
- On the navigation screen, hold it down to exit the screen.

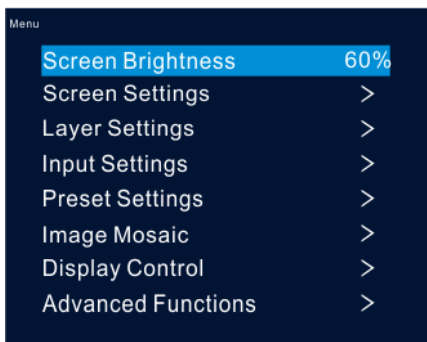

## 5.2 Screen Brightness

Adjust the screen brightness in an eye-friendly way according to the current ambient brightness. The appropriate adjustment of screen brightness can also extend the service life of the LED screen.

Step 1 Press the knob to enter the main menu screen.

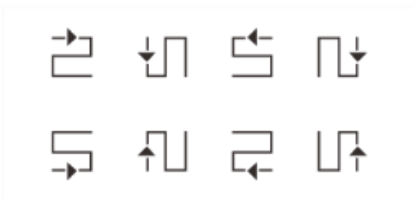
- Step 2 Select **Screen Brightness** and press the knob to confirm the selection.
- Step 3 Rotate the knob to adjust the brightness value, and the LED screen will display the effect in real-time. Then press the knob to apply the brightness when you are satisfied with it.

## 5.3 Screen Settings

### 5.3.1 Quick Configuration

#### Preconditions

- LED screen must be a regular screen.
- Cabinets of the screen must be regular cabinets with the same resolution.
- The following data flow settings are supported. During data flow settings, you must ensure that the physical connection of each port is along the same direction and downward to next one.

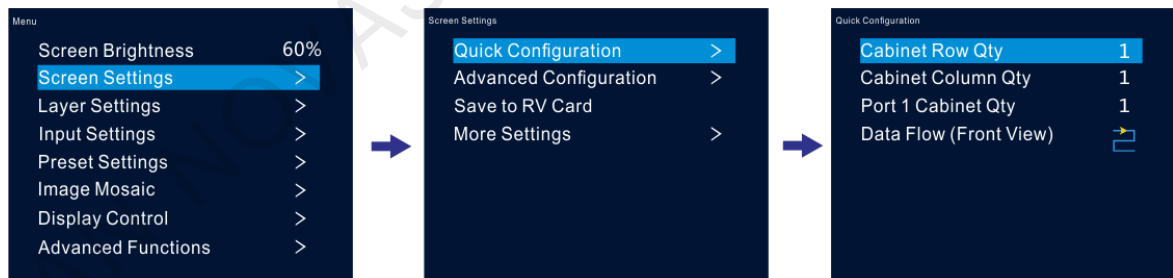


- During data flow settings, you must ensure that the Ethernet Port 1 is at the beginning position of the whole physical connection.

#### Procedure

- Step 1 Power on the LED screen.
- Step 2 Go to **Screen Settings > Quick Configuration**, and press the knob to enter the quick configuration screen.

- Step 3 Set **Cabinet Row Qty** and **Cabinet Column Qty** according to the actual row and column quantities of the cabinets.
- Step 4 Select **Port 1 Cabinet Qty** to set the quantity of the cabinets loaded by Ethernet port 1.
- Step 5 Select **Data Flow** and press the knob, then select an appropriate one.

Data flow is the physical cabinet connection pattern when viewed in front of the screen.

During data flow settings, you can view the real-time effects of different data flow settings on LED display by rotating the knob. When you are satisfied with the LED display image, press the knob to apply the settings.

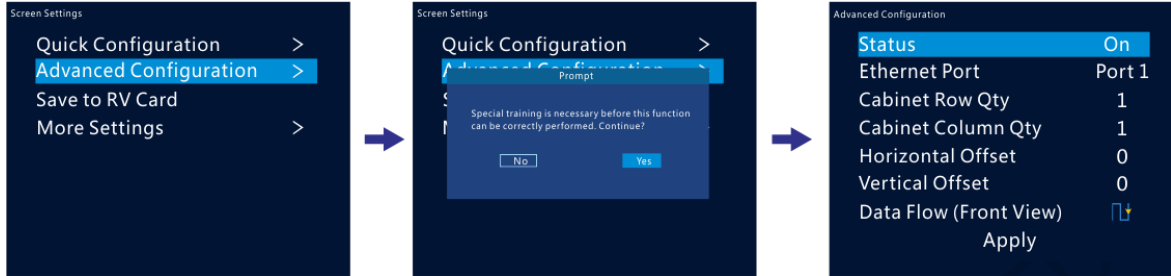
### 5.3.2 Advanced Configuration

Set the cabinet row and column quantities, horizontal offset, vertical offset and data flow of the cabinets loaded by a single Ethernet port.

- Step 1 Press the knob to enter the main menu screen.

- Step 2 Go to **Screen Settings > Advanced Configuration**, and press the knob to enter the advanced configuration screen.
- Step 3 Turn on the advanced configuration function, and then set the cabinet row and column quantities, horizontal offset, vertical offset and data flow for the target Ethernet port.

### 5.3.3 Save to RV Card

Send and save the screen configuration to the receiving card. The configuration data will not be lost after the device is powered off.

### 5.3.4 More Settings

### Mapping

Mapping is used to show the relations between the cabinets of LED screen and the sending devices. You can view or check the connections between the cabinets.

## Load RCFGx Files

After the LED screen is powered on, if a certain cabinet or the entire LED screen is not lit, you can save the receiving card configuration files (\*.rcfgx) that have been configured on NovaLCT software to the USB drive, and then load the files from the USB drive.

The NovaPro UHD does not support importing the configuration files by directly connecting to NovaLCT.

## LED Screen Color

Adjust the color temperature and Gamma value of LED screen to make the images displayed on the screen more clear and vivid.

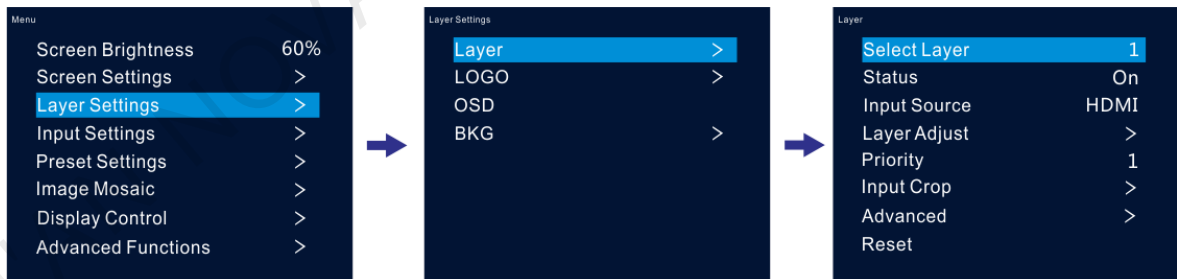
- Color Temperature: Adjust the cool or warm degree of images displayed on LED screen.
- Gamma: Adjust the image distortion degree from the input to output. The greater the value is, the more distorted the image will be. The value ranges from 0.25 to 4.00.

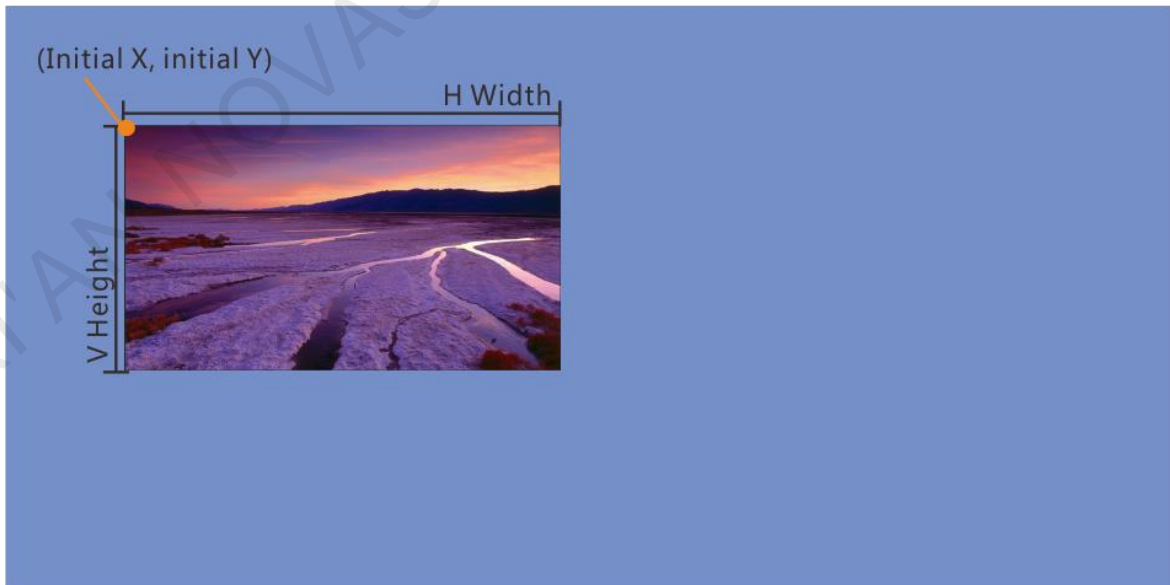
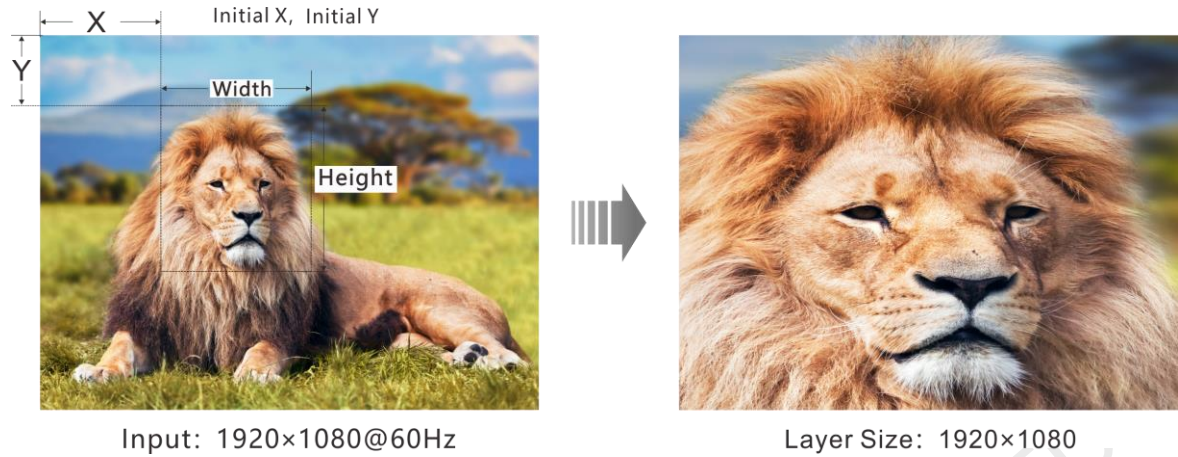




Figure 5-9 Input crop

Copy

Add a new layer displaying the cloned or mirrored image.

Menu	Description
Status	Turn on or turn off the layer copying function. The options are <b>None</b> , <b>Clone</b> , <b>Left Mirror</b> and <b>Right Mirror</b> . <b>None</b> indicates turning off the function.
Initial X	Set the horizontal initial coordinate of the new layer. The vertical initial coordinate of the new layer keeps the same with that of the old one.
Reset	Reset all the settings to defaults.

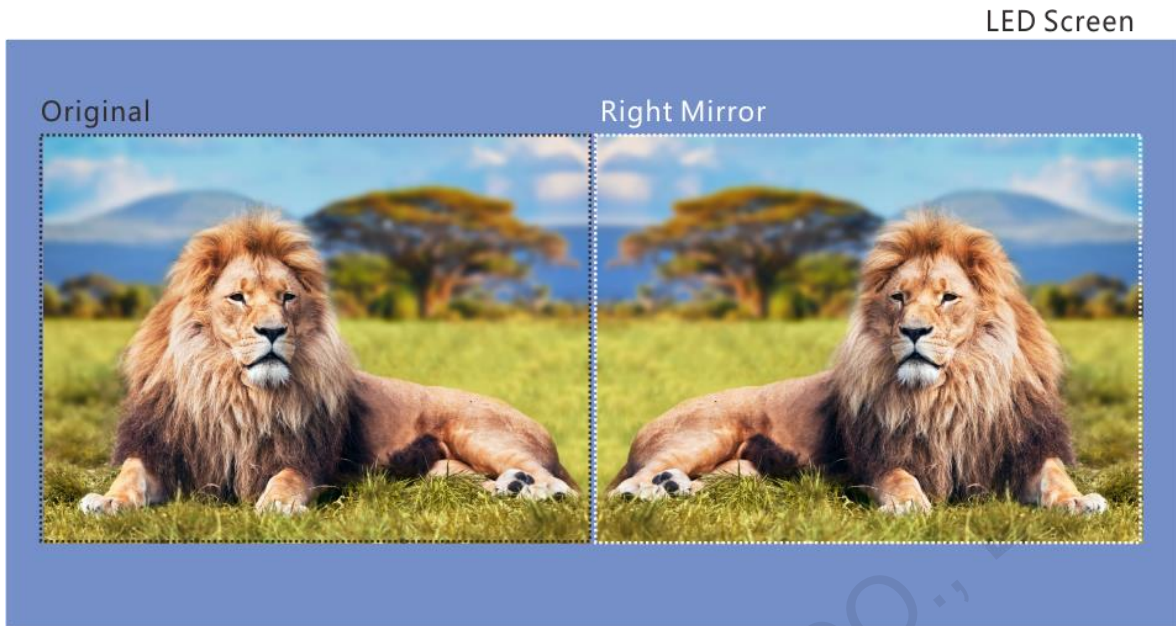


Figure 5-12 Left mirror



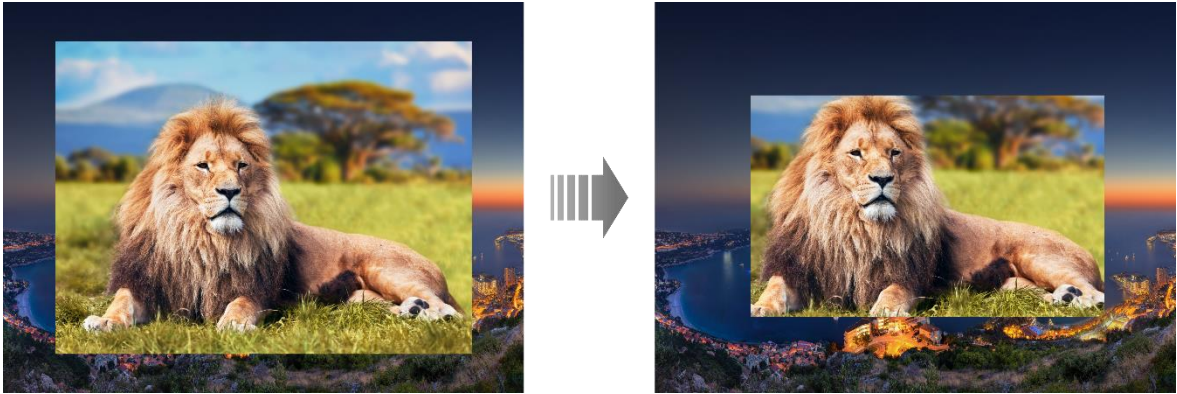
## Mask

Mask a certain part of the layer. The area that has been masked is transparent and the layer size remains the same. The adjustment unit is pixel.

Menu	Description
Status	Turn on or turn off the layer mask function.
Mode	The options are <b>Mask Top</b> , <b>Mask Bottom</b> , <b>Mask Left</b> and <b>Mask Right</b> . The value ranges from 0 to the vertical height/horizontal width of the layer, and defaults to <b>0</b> .
Reset	Reset all the settings to defaults.



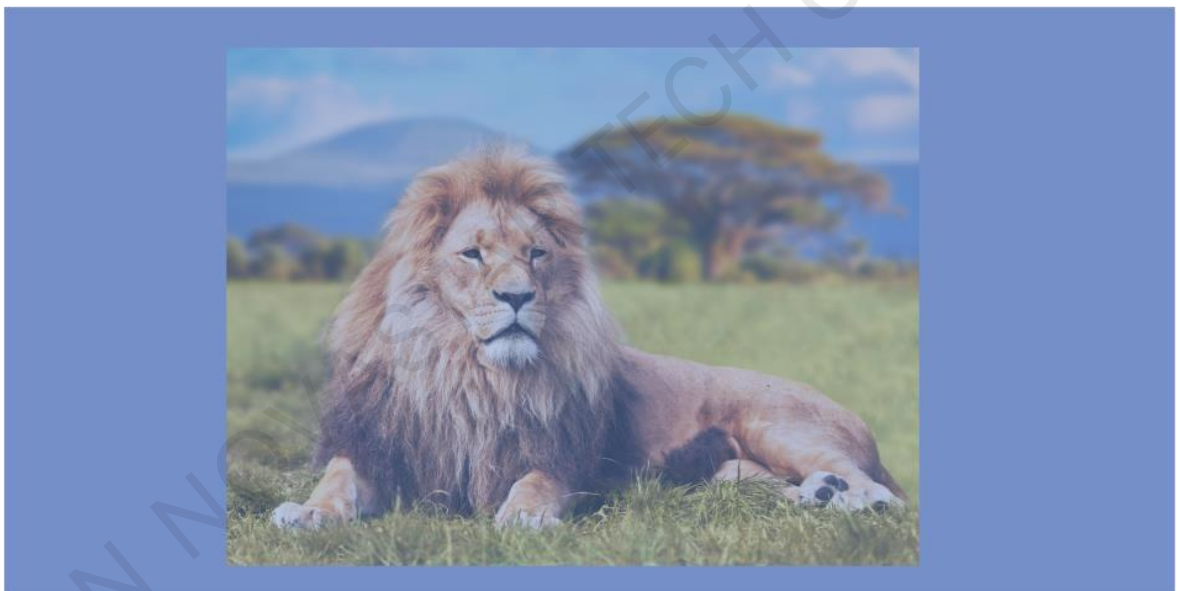
Figure 5-13 Mask (mask top, bottom, left and right)



## Opacity

Set the opacity of the layer. The value ranges from 0% (transparent) to 100% (nontransparent). The default value is **100%** and the adjustment stepping is 1%.

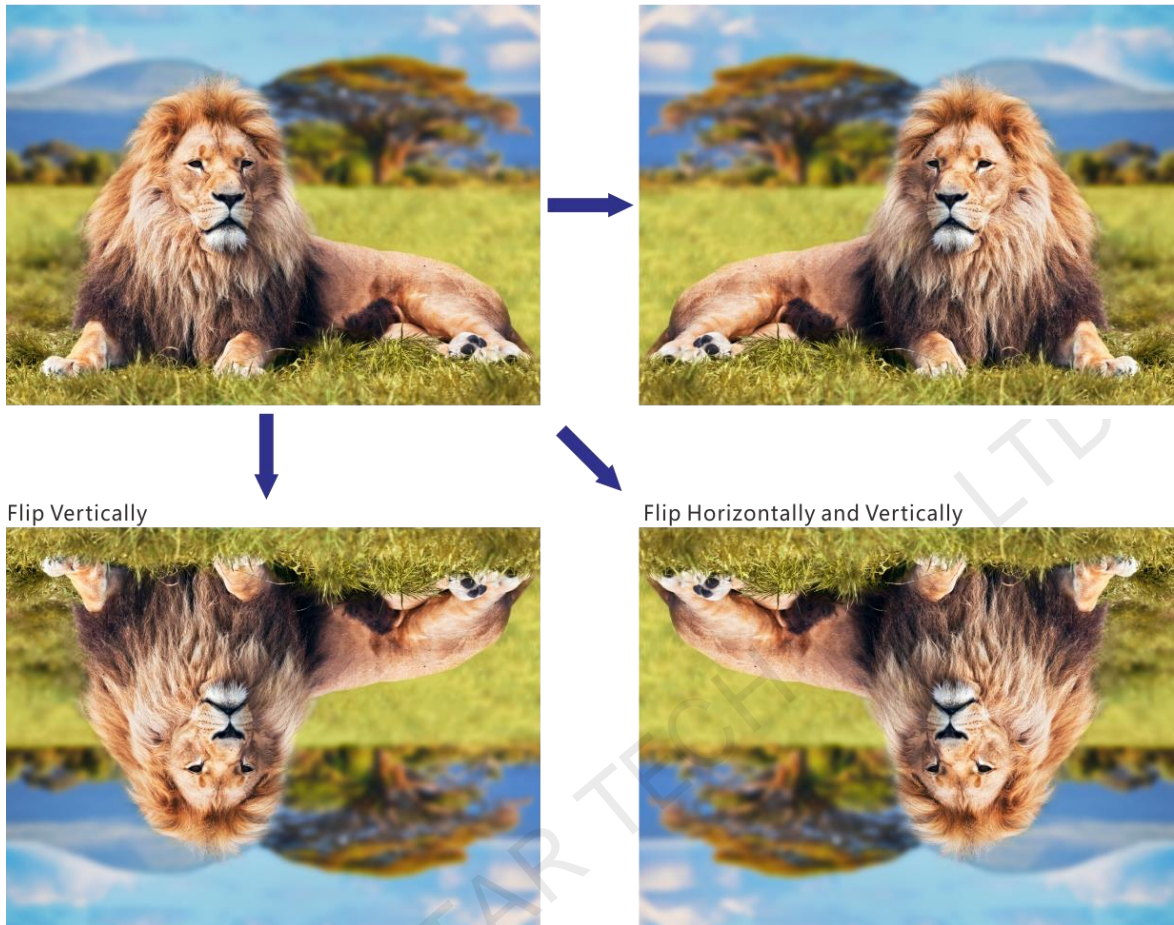
Figure 5-14 50% opacity



## Flip

Flip the layer image. The options are **None**, **H**, **V** and **H/V**. **None** indicates not flipping.

## Color

Adjust the layer color parameters, including brightness, contrast, saturation, hue, monochrome and inverting colors.

Menu	Description
Brightness	Adjust the brightness of the layer image. The value ranges from 0 to 100, and defaults to <b>50</b> .
Contrast	Adjust the contrast of the layer image. The value ranges from 0 to 100, and defaults to <b>50</b> .
Saturation	Adjust the saturation of the layer image. The value ranges from 0 to 100, and defaults to <b>50</b> .
Hue	Adjust the hue of the layer image. The value ranges from $-180$ to $+180$ , and defaults to <b>0</b> .
Monochrome	Select whether to set the layer image to gray scale image. The default option is <b>Off</b> .
Invert Colors	Invert the color to its complementary color that combined with the original color makes white (RGB: 255,255,255). For example, if the original color is red (RGB: 255,0,0), the inverted color is cyan (RGB: 0, 255, 255).

## Shape

Set the layer shape. The options are **Normal**, **Heart**, **Star**, **Circle**, **Crescent**, **Oval**, and **Diamond**.

Initial Y	Set the vertical initial coordinate of the LOGO file upon the screen. The value ranges from -8192 to +8192, and defaults to <b>0</b> .
Opacity	Set the opacity of the added LOGO file. The value ranges from 0% (transparent) to 100% (nontransparent), and defaults to <b>100%</b> .
Crop	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Status: Turn on or turn off the LOGO cropping function. Figure 5-21 Single link mode

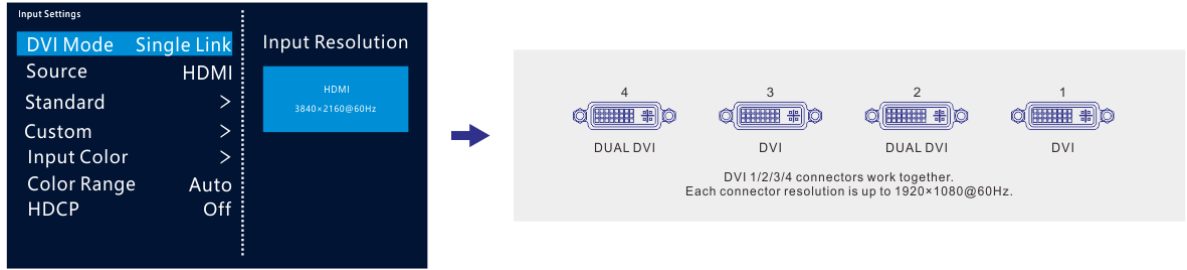
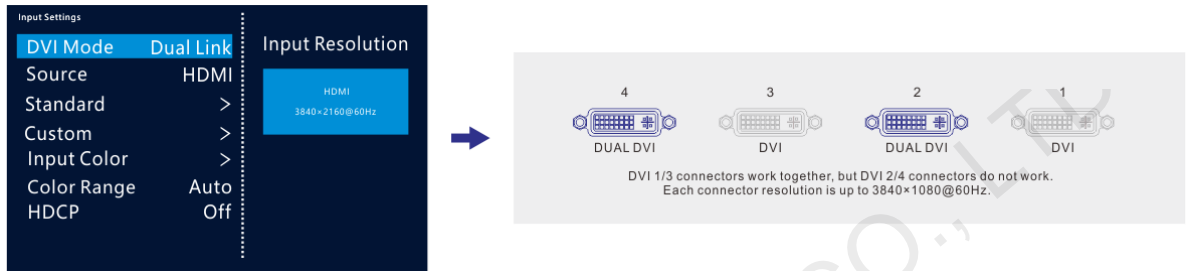


Figure 5-22 Dual link mode

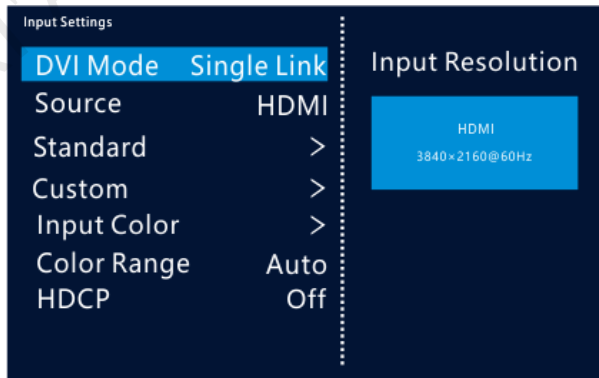

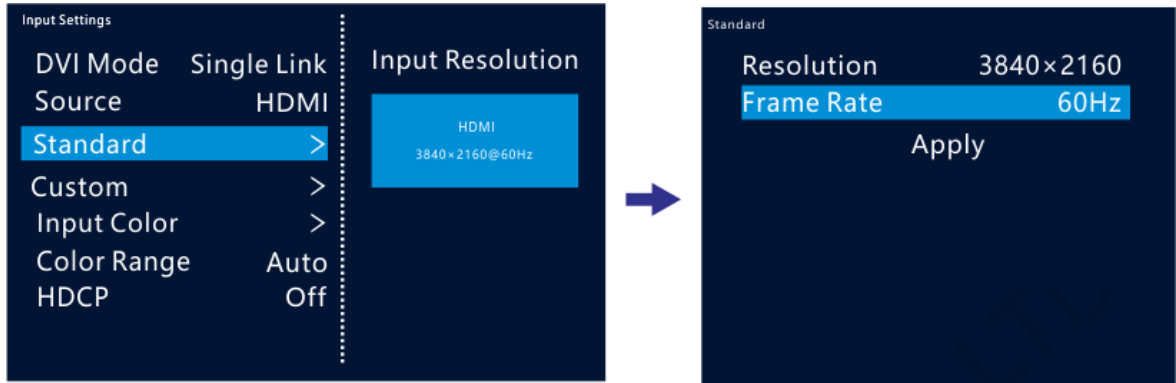

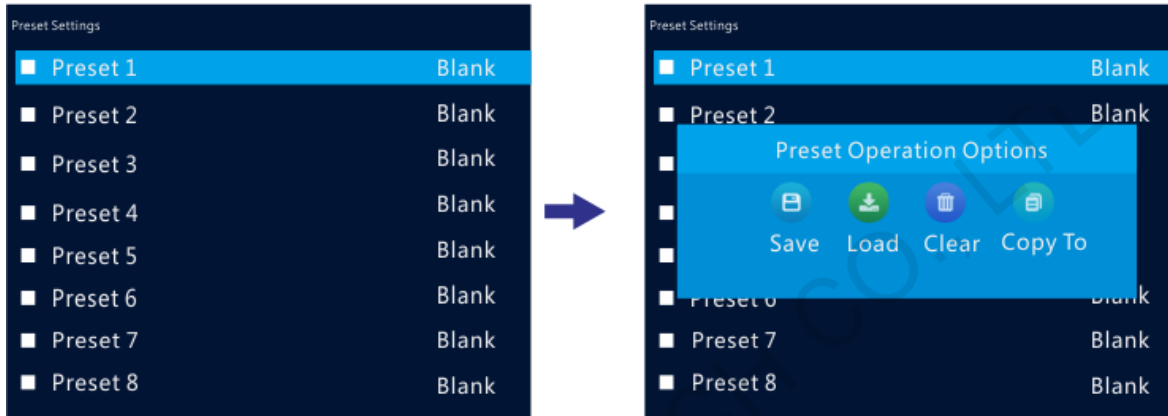

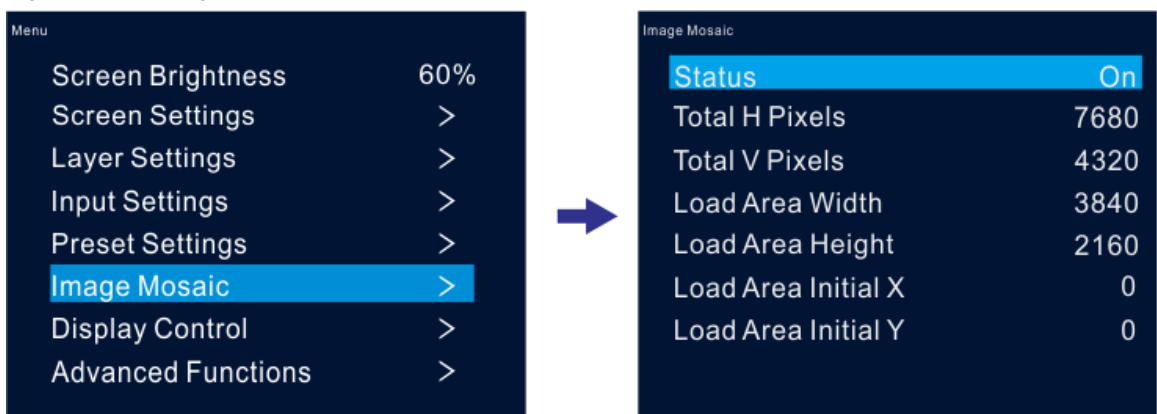

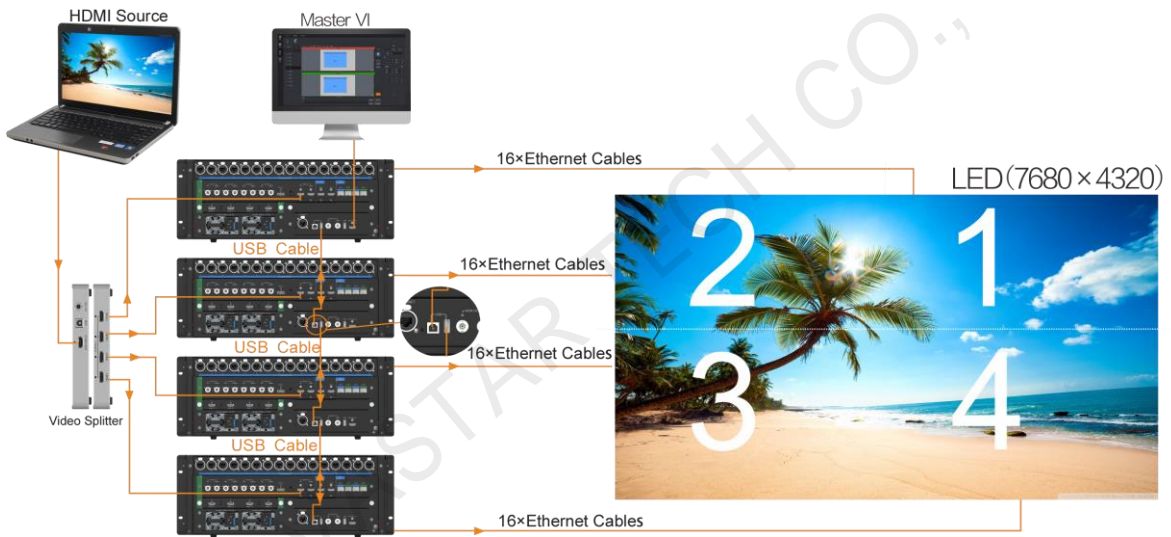

Figure 5-29 System architecture

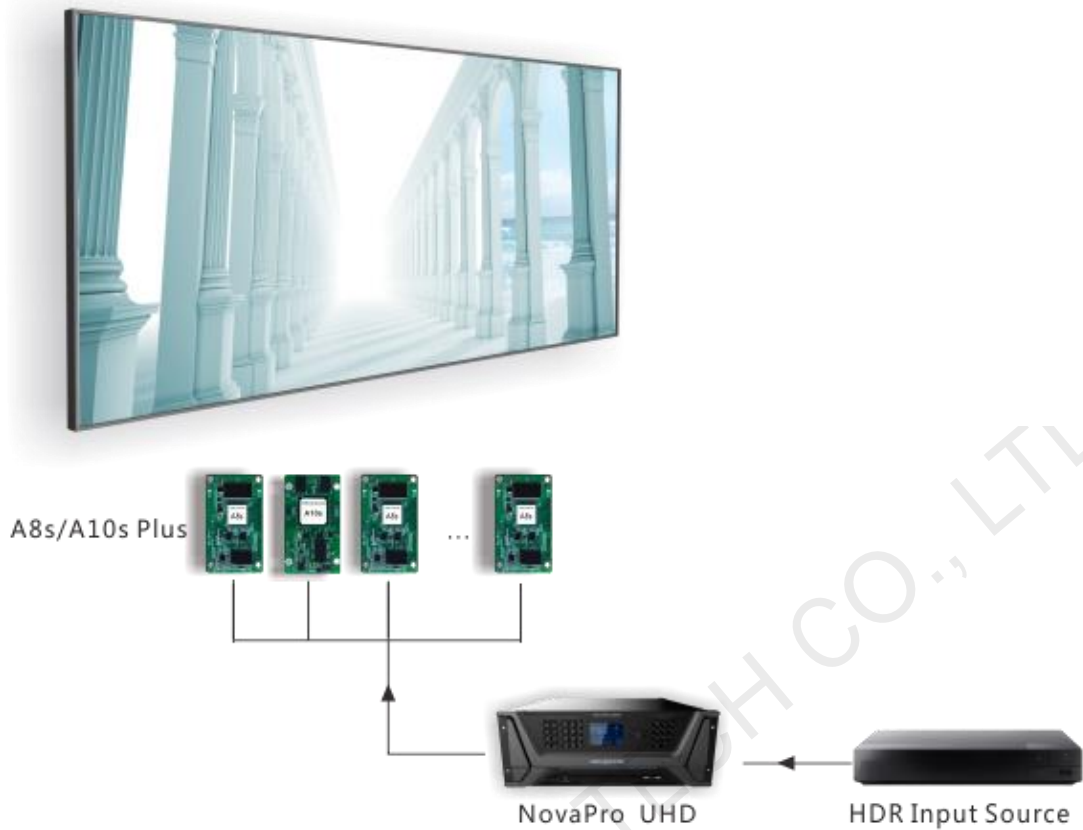


Figure 5-30 HDR effect

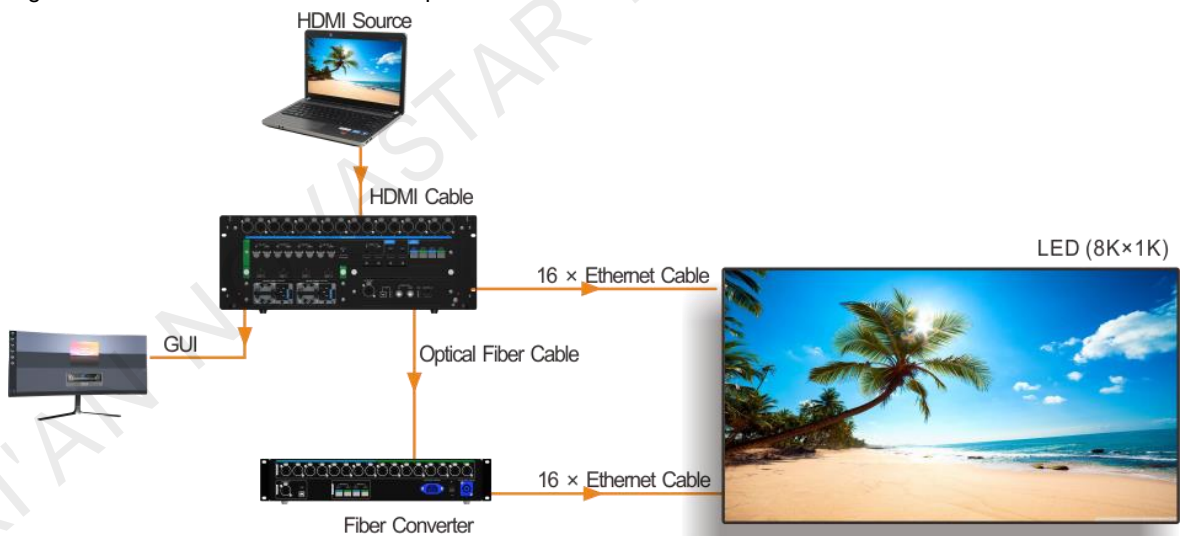

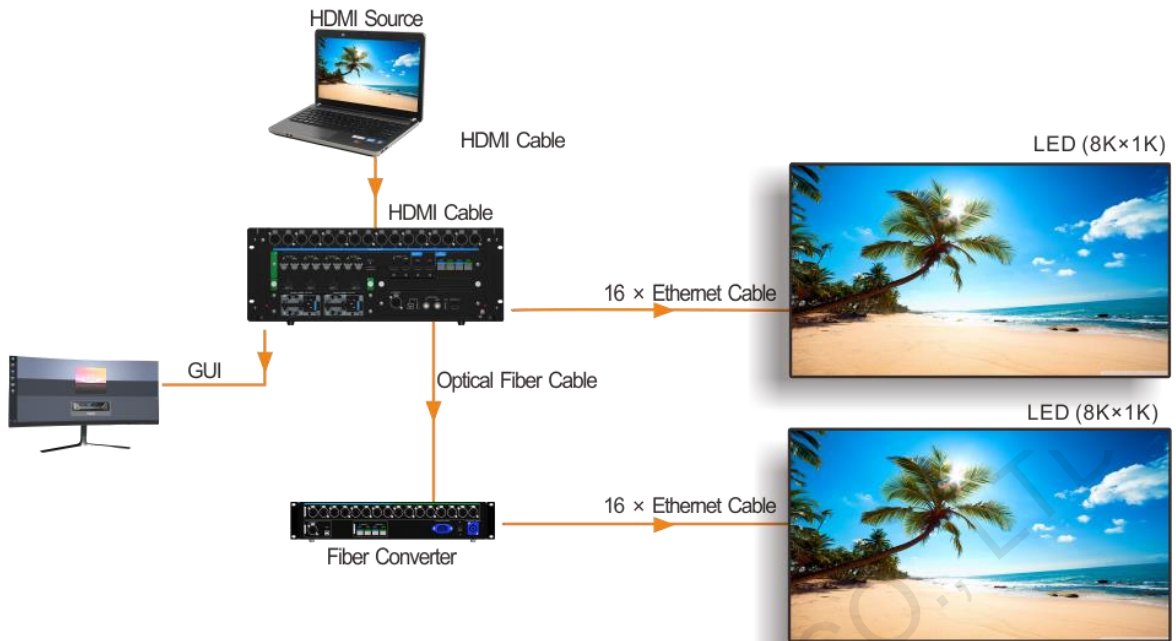

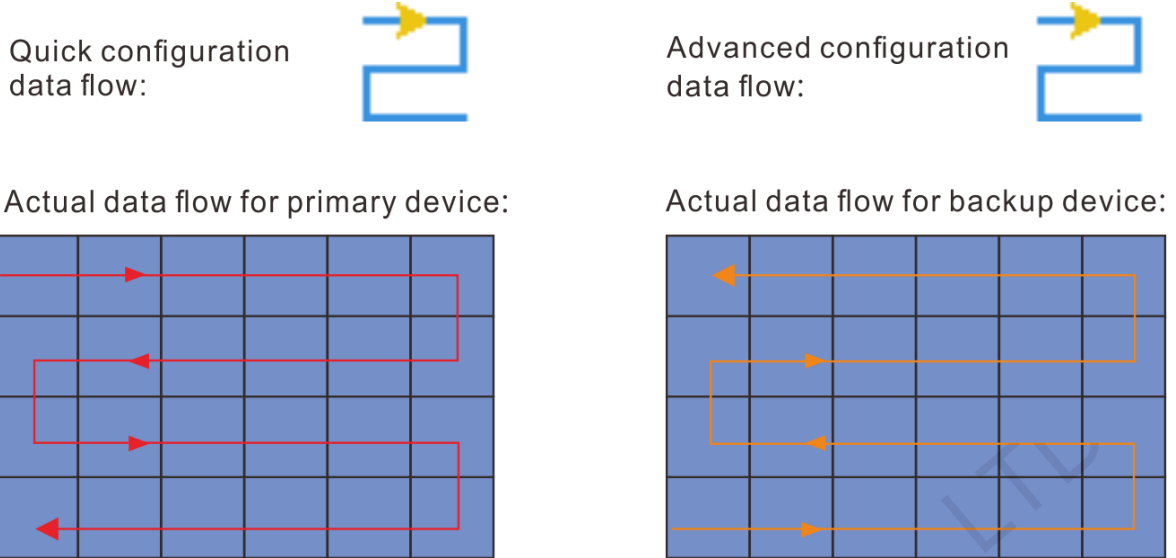

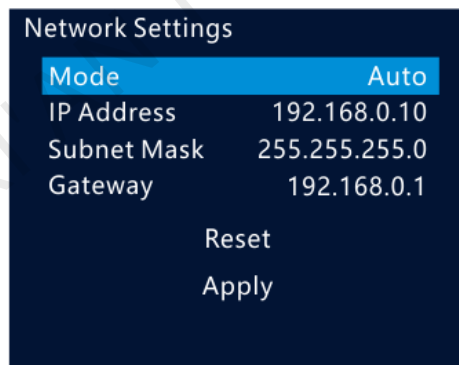

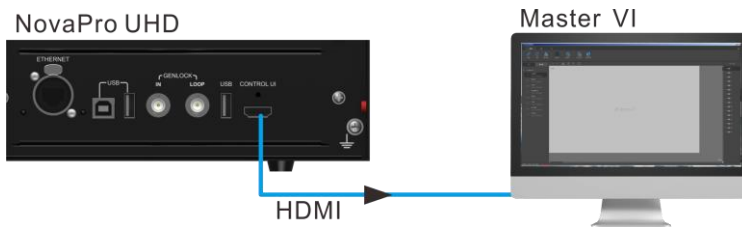

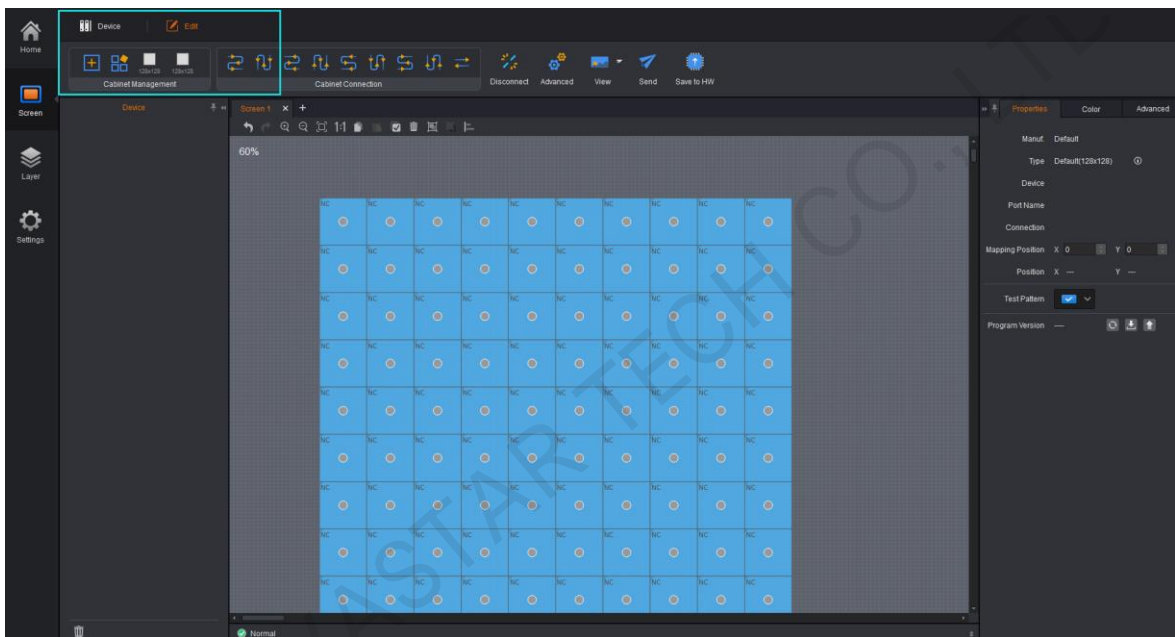

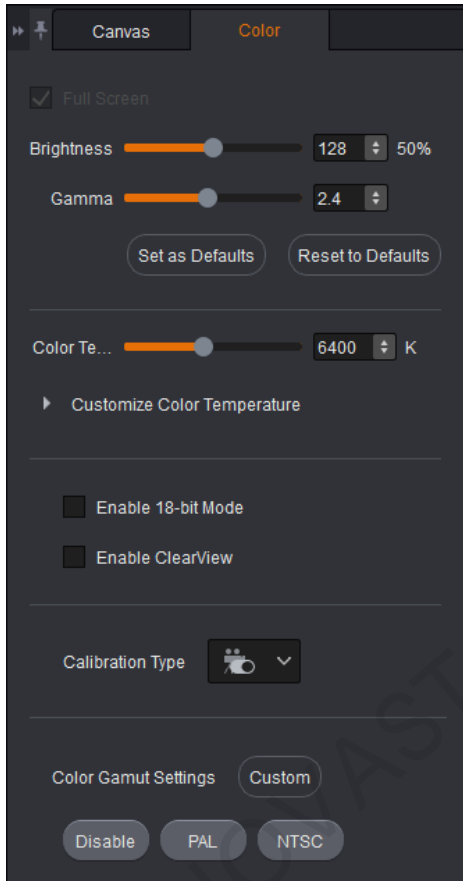




Figure 6-6 Color gamut

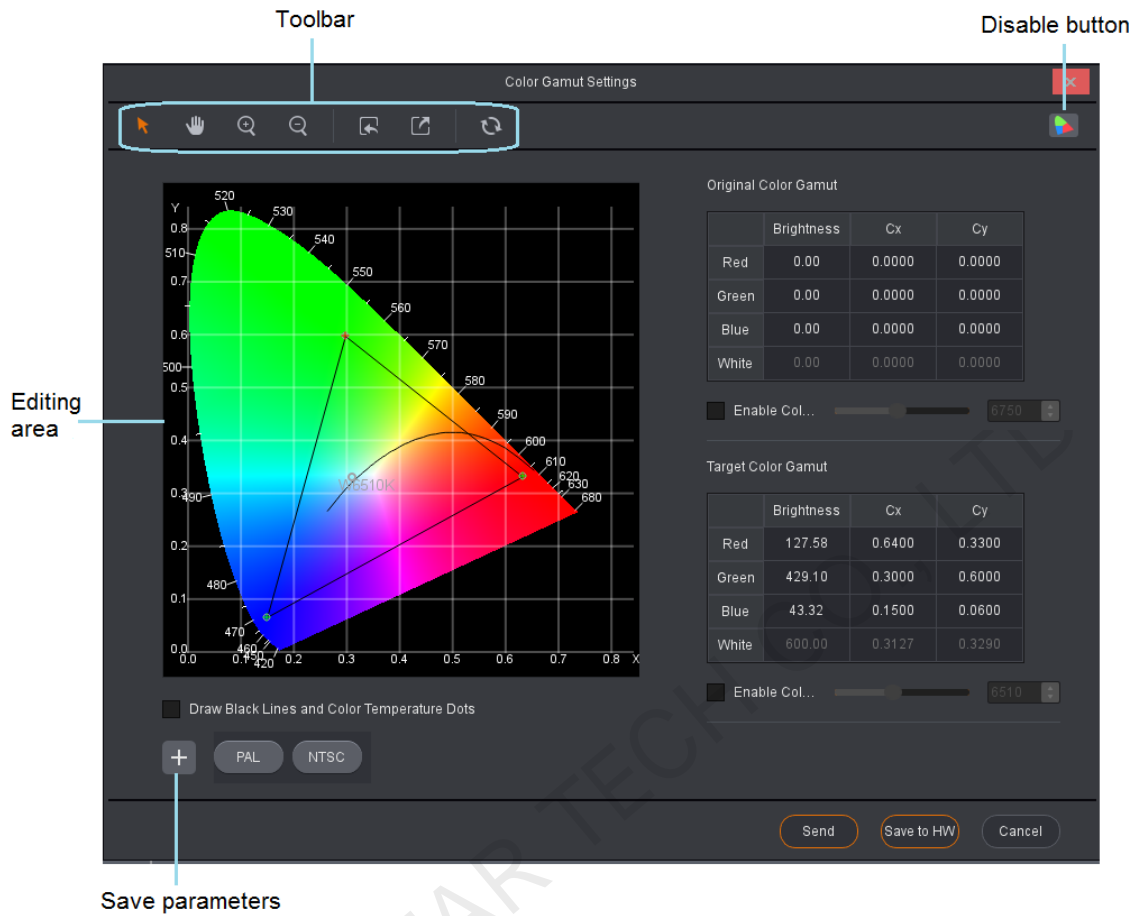

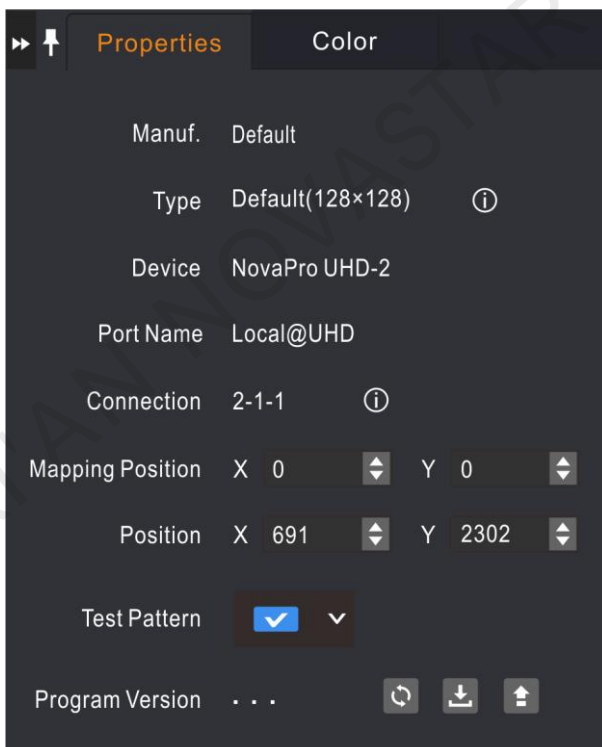

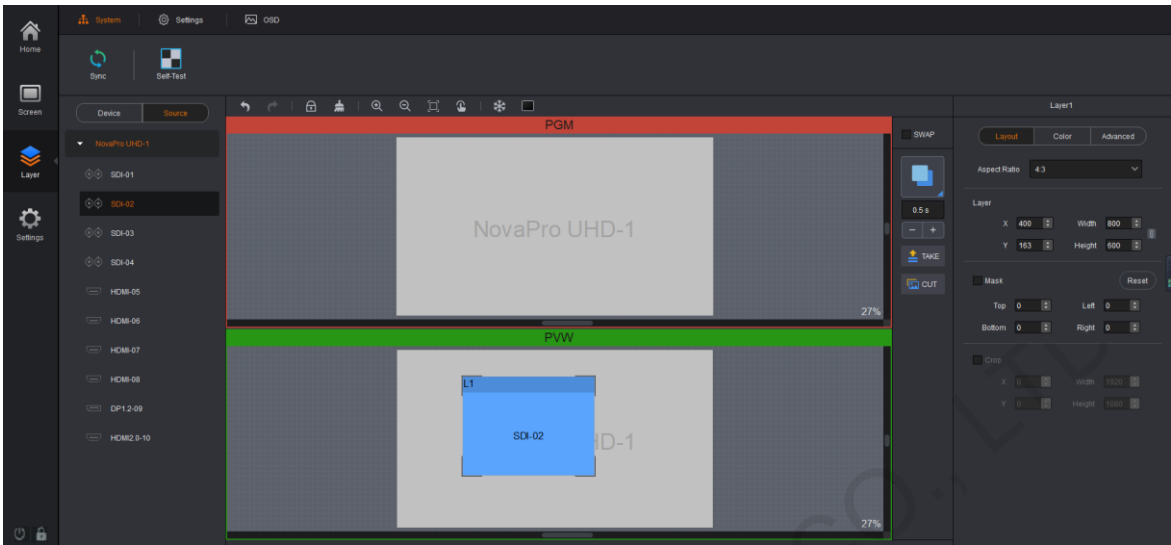

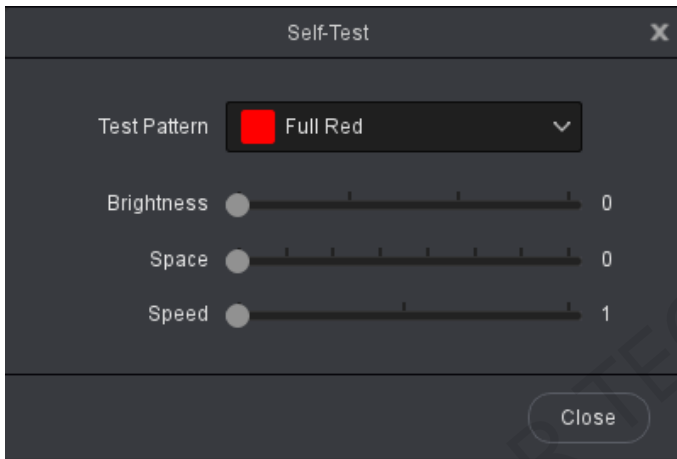
### 6.3.1 System

#### Sync

Click **Sync** to obtain all the device data, such as the layer data and preset data.

#### Self-Test

Test whether the currently-connected LED screen can display the images normally through the test pattern.



- Test Pattern: Select the image type to be displayed on the screen.
- Brightness: Set the brightness of the test pattern displayed on the LED screen.
- Space: Set the width of gradient color or the space between test lines. This parameter is configurable when the test pattern is not a pure color.
- Speed: Set the movement speed of the test lines. This parameter is configurable when the test pattern is lines.

Click **Close** to exit the self-test settings screen. When a test pattern is displayed on the LED screen, click **Self-Test** and select **Normal** on the self-test screen to close the test pattern.

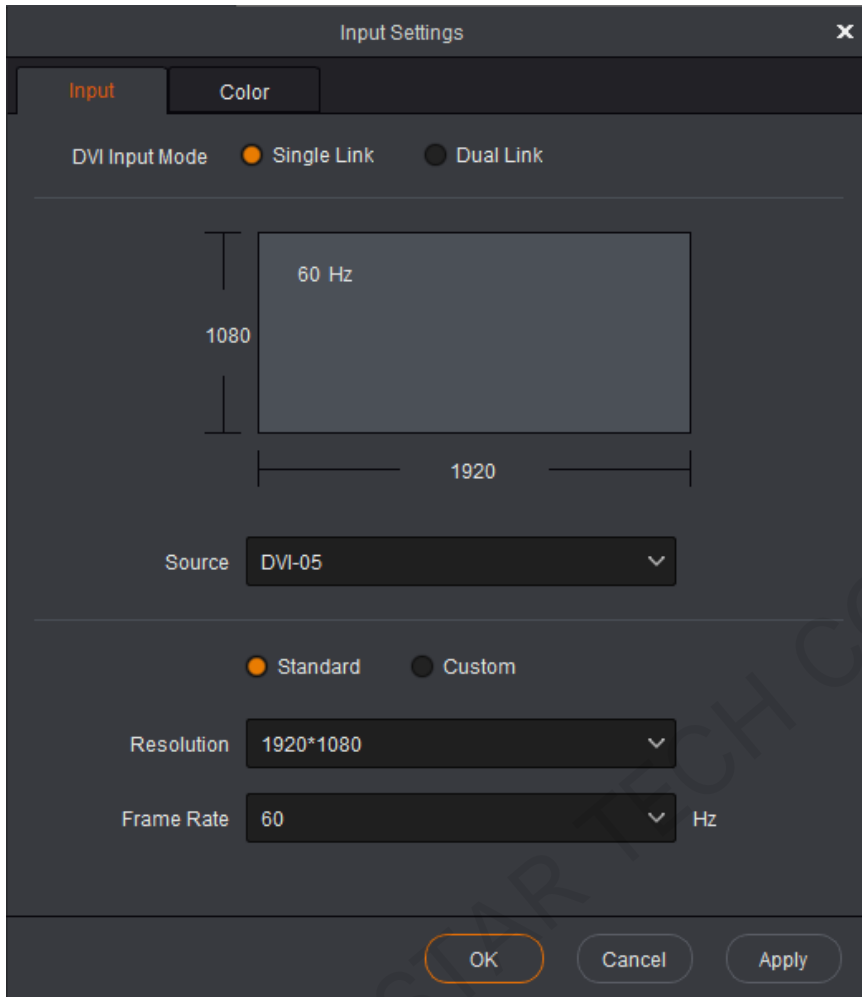

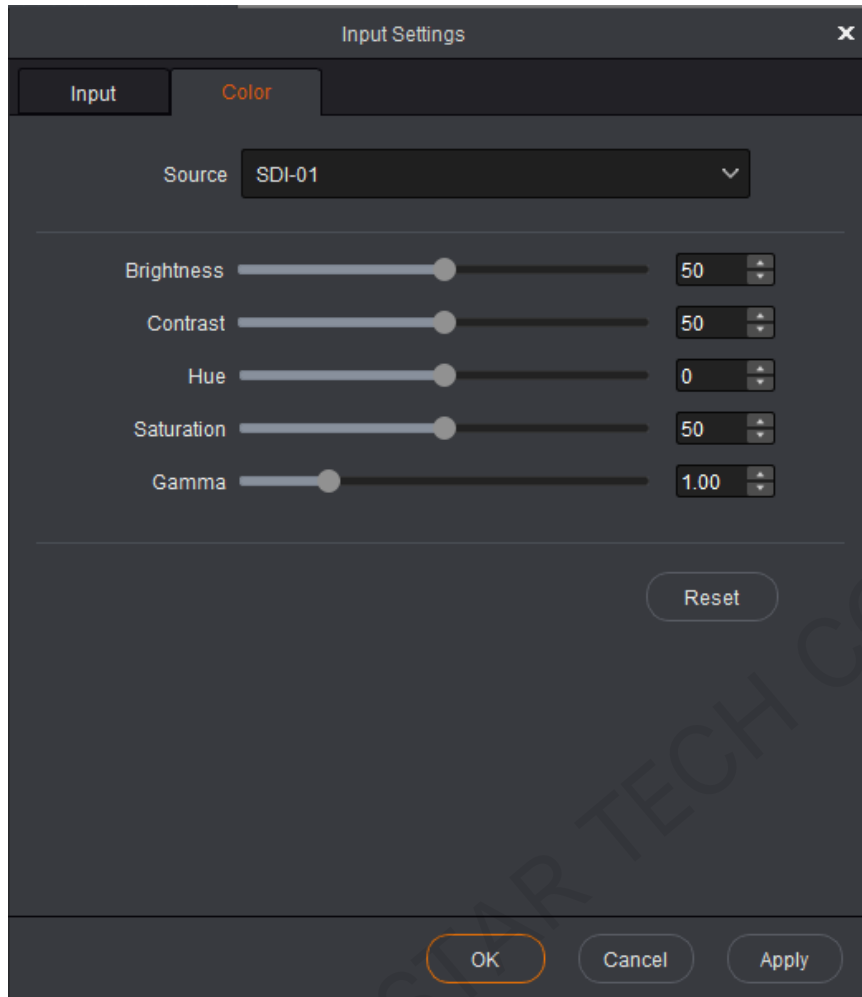

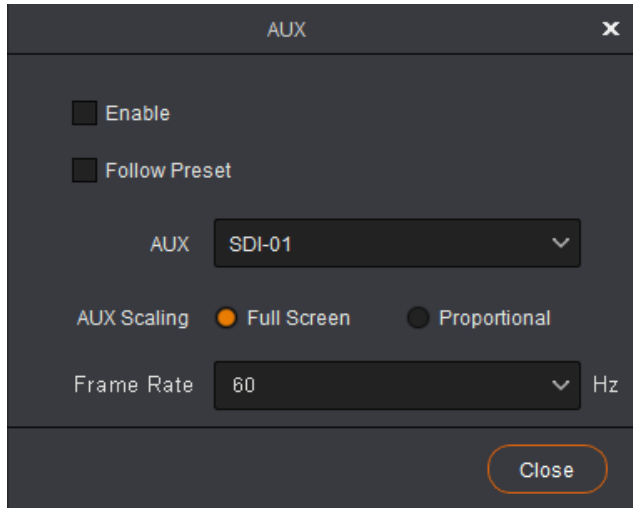
Figure 6-13 Output color



## AUX

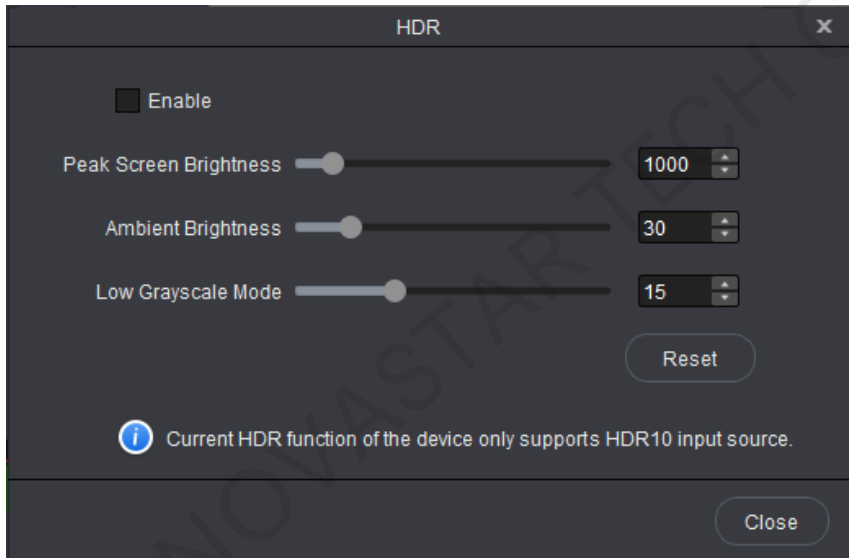
The NovaPro UHD supports one AUX. You can output any input source, PVW or PGM to a specified display device through the AUX connector.

- Select **Enable** to enable the AUX function. When selected, the following functions will be available.
- Follow Preset: Set whether the AUX follows the preset during switching.
  - Selected: If the preset has AUX data, the AUX input source will be switched during preset switching.
  - Deselected: The AUX input source will not be switched during preset switching.
- AUX: Select a desired AUX signal source from the drop-down list.
- AUX Scaling: Set the AUX display mode.
  - Full Screen: Make the image display in full screen.
  - Proportional: Scale the image proportionally and then display it on the screen.
- Frame Rate: Set the frame rate for the AUX connector.



## HDR

HDR function can greatly enhance the display image quality, allowing for a more clear and vivid image when the device is used together with NovaStar A8s/A10s Plus receiving cards.



Select **Enable** to enable the HDR function. The HDR parameters are described as followings.

Figure 6-14 Adding OSD images

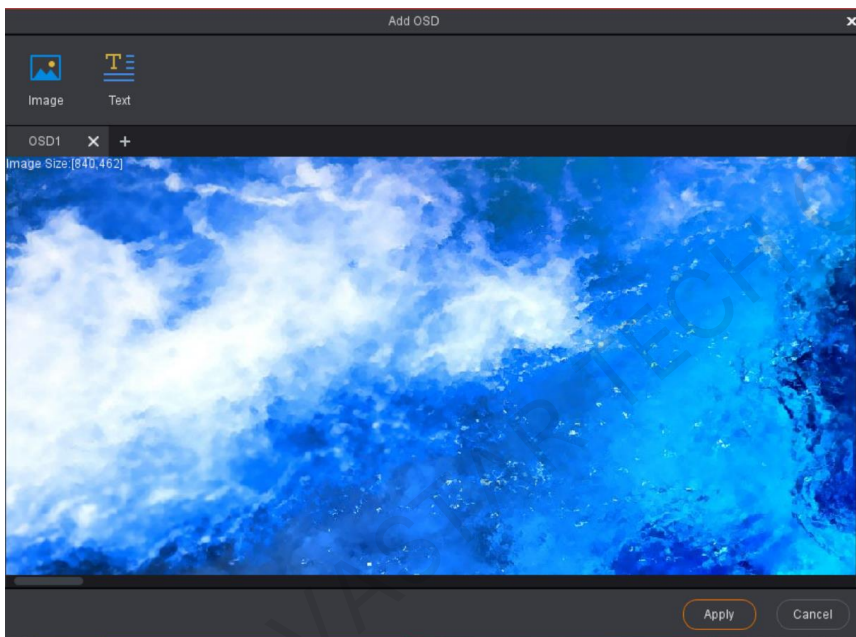
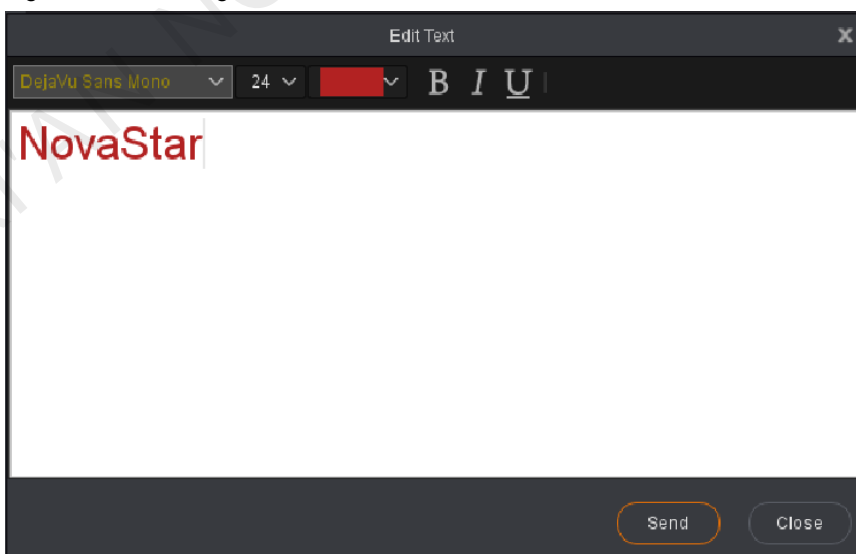


Figure 6-15 Adding OSD texts



Step 2 In the video editing area, click and drag the mouse to create a custom-sized layer.

You can also select a signal source and drag it to the video editing area, and then release the mouse to create a layer.

- When you move the mouse to any edge of the layer and a double-headed arrow appears, you can click and drag the layer edge to adjust the layer size.
- When you move the mouse to the layer area, you can click and drag the layer to change its position.
- When a single layer is selected, you can press the arrow buttons to fine tune the layer position, while hold down the **Shift** key and press the arrow buttons to fine tune the layer size.
- When you move the mouse to the layer top, five buttons appear in the top right corner of the layer. The detailed button functions are shown in [Table 6-5](#).

### 6.3.5 Preset Settings

Up to 16 presets are supported. The preset will be saved in the system automatically after you have completed a preset settings, which is easier for future use.

A preset not only contains layer data, but also saved BKG, LOGO or OSD data.

Step 1 After the layer settings, click **Preset** to enter the preset page.

Step 2 Right click the desired preset.

Step 3 Select **Save** to save the layer data to the preset.

When you need to drive a large screen which exceeds the loading capacity of a single NovaPro UHD unit, the image mosaic function offers you a good choice. You can link two or more device units to meet your requirements.

The following figure illustrates the image mosaic function with two NovaPro UHD units.

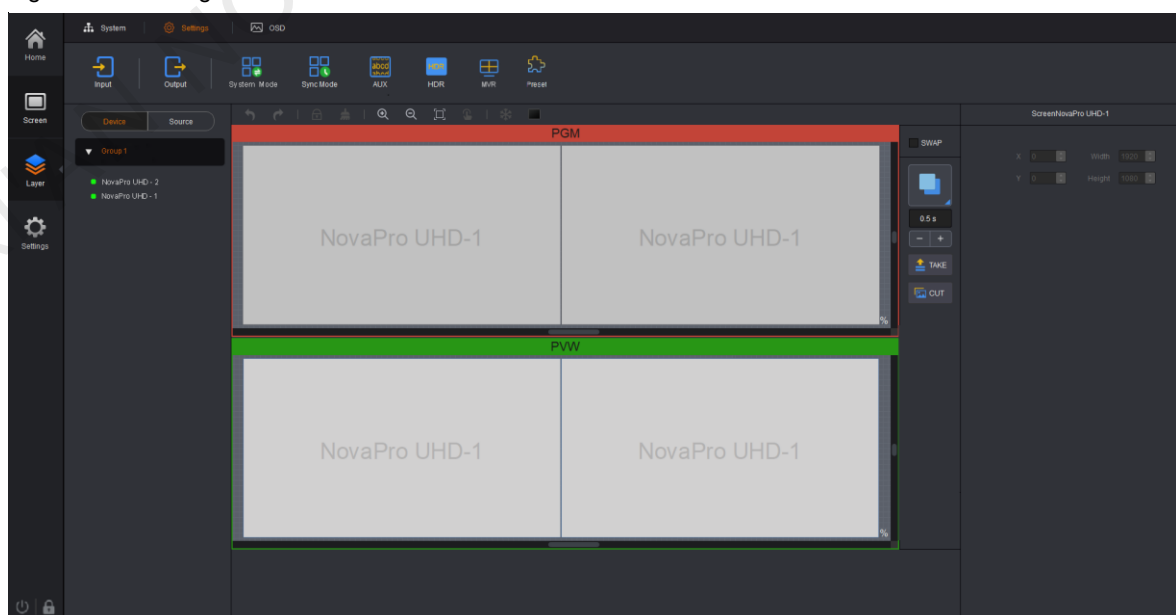

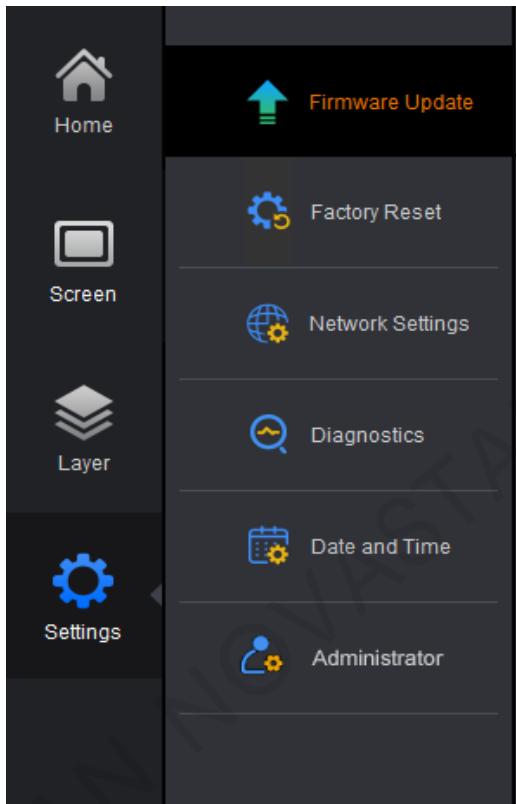
**Note:**


When the layer locates within one device area and does not cross any more devices, the layer occupies the layer resources of the current device.

When the layer crosses multiple devices, the layer occupies the layer resources of all devices it crosses.

After a layer is added, the device mosaic layout cannot be changed. If you need to change the mosaic output, please delete the layer first.

## 6.4 Settings



- Firmware Update: Update the firmware through a USB drive. Click  to select the upgrade file.
- Factory Reset: When multiple device units are linked, select the device to be reset from the drop-down list and reset all its parameters to defaults.
  - Save IP: Reset the device parameters to factory settings, but save the device IP address.
  - Reset all: Reset all the device parameters to factory settings.
- Network Settings: Select **DHCP** or **Static** and set the device IP address, subnet mask and gateway of the device.
- Diagnostics: Diagnose the device when the device fails and send the result to the technical support of NovaStar to solve the problems as soon as possible.
- Date and Time: Set the device date and time.
- Administrator: Set or change the user password.

# 7 Web Operations

## 7.1 Overview

The NovaPro UHD allows for the controlling on a PC. You can set the device related parameters through a web browser. The settings are the same as that of the device front panel.

The supported web browsers include:

- Chrome 76 or later version
- Safari 10 or later version

---

### Note:

When you use a PC to control the device, the device front panel buttons are locked and a lock icon appears on the front panel screen.

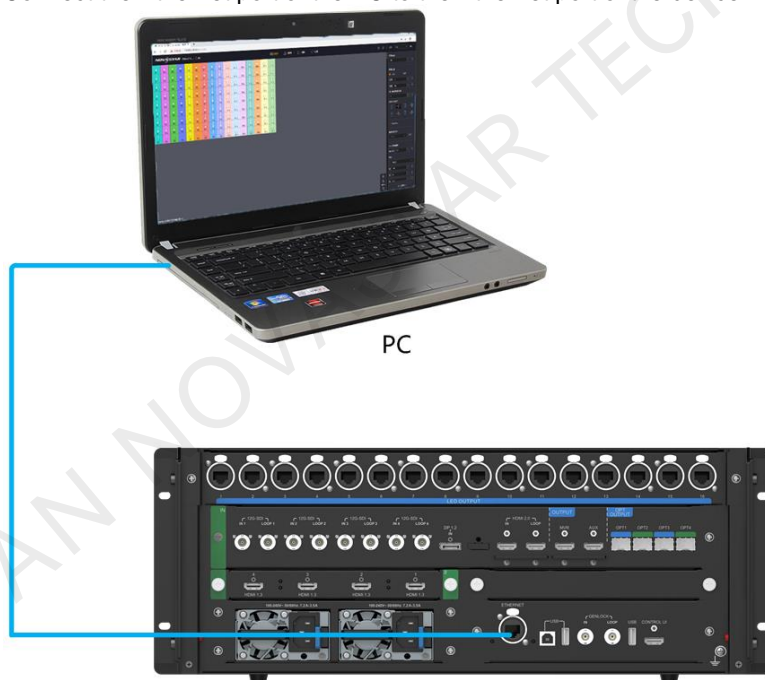

### 7.1.1 Device Connection

Hardware connections for device control on a PC are as follows.

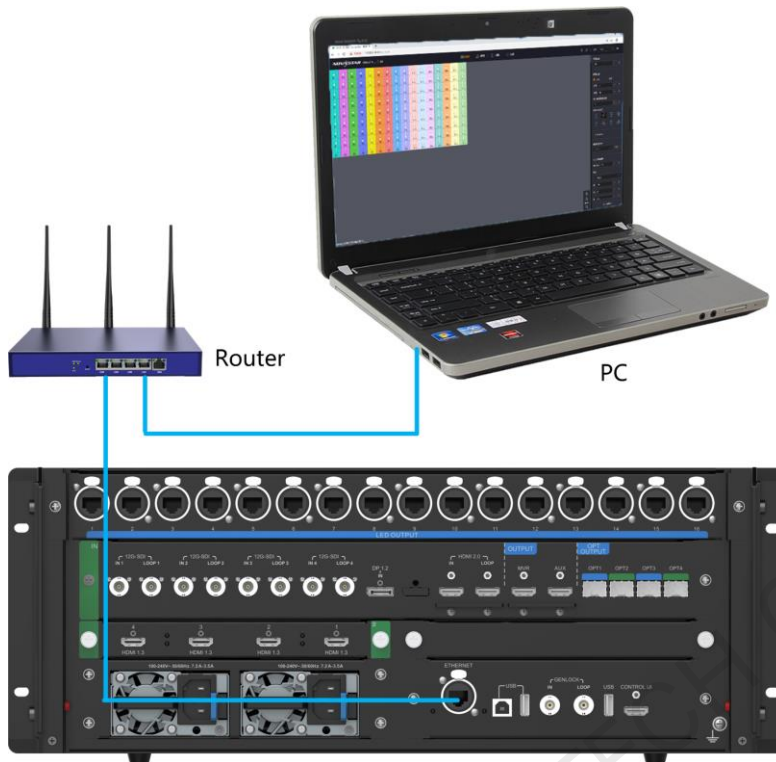
- Direct connection

Connect the Ethernet port of the PC to the Ethernet port of the device with an Ethernet cable.



- Using a router

Connect the Ethernet ports of the device and PC to the LAN ports of the router.



### 7.1.2 Web Page Login

- Step 1 Open the suggested web browser on your computer, and enter "http://the device IP address" into the address bar.
- Step 2 Press **Enter** and the browser will jump to the login interface of the Web page.
- Step 3 Enter the login password.

**Note:**

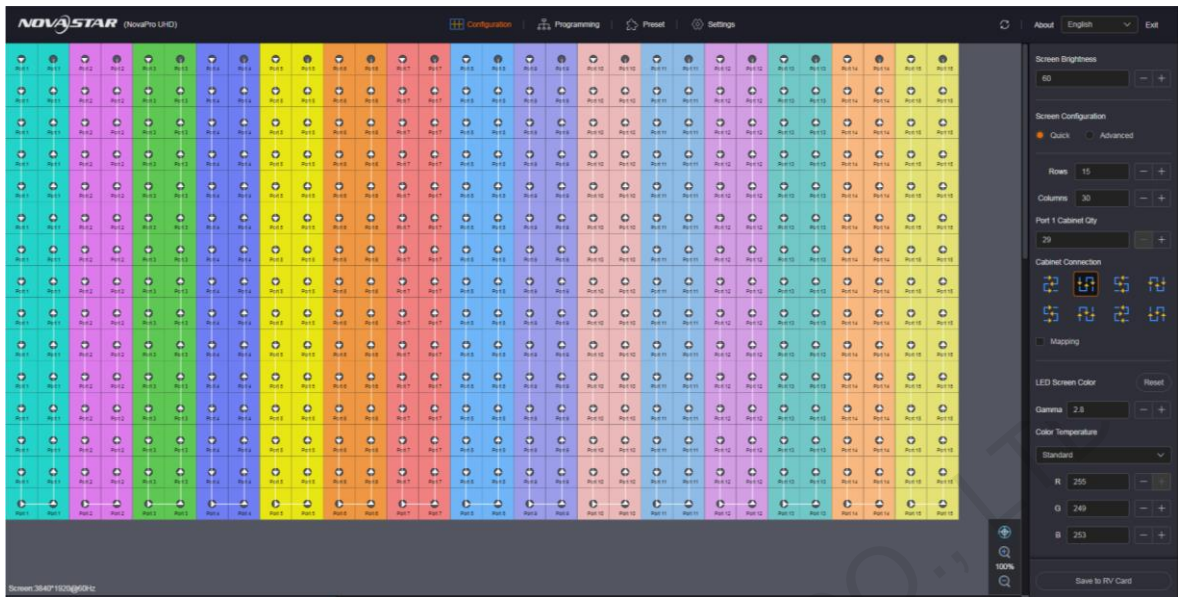
The default password is "88888888". You can go to **Settings > Change Password** to change the password after login.

- Step 4 Click **Login** to log in to the Web page.



### 7.1.3 Web UI Introduction



- Configuration: Set the LED screen loaded by the NovaPro UHD. The settings include LED screen brightness, quick configuration, advanced configuration, mapping, cabinet configuration file applying and LED screen color.
- Programming: Perform the layer and layer-related properties settings, BKG management, preset saving and loading, black out and freeze of the screen.
- Preset: Load, copy and paste, rename, import and export the presets.
- Settings: Set the output, AUX, test pattern, synchronization, system mode, network, HDR, low latency, firmware update, date and time, as well as factory reset.
-  Refresh and synchronize the device configuration information.
- Language: Change the UI language. English and Chinese are supported.
- Exit: Log out of the Web page.

## 7.2 Screen Configuration

### 7.2.1 Screen Brightness

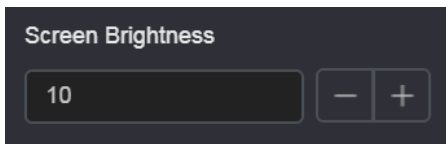
Step 1 Click **Configuration** to enter the screen configuration page.

Step 2 In the text box below **Screen Brightness**, enter a brightness value directly.

The brightness value will be sent to the device in real time, and the LED brightness will be changed accordingly.

You can also click **+** or **-** to fine tune the value.

### 7.2.2 Screen Configuration

#### 7.2.2.1 Quick Configuration

#### Prerequisites

- LED screen must be a regular screen.
- Cabinets of the screen must be regular cabinets with the same resolution.
- The following data flow settings are supported. During data flow settings, you must ensure that the physical connection of each port is along the same direction and downward to next one.

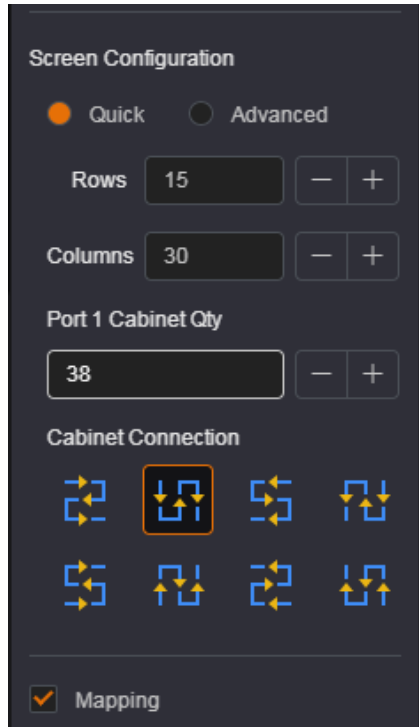


- During data flow settings, you must ensure that the Ethernet Port 1 is at the beginning position of the whole physical connection.
- The quantity of cabinets loaded by each Ethernet port must meet the following requirement: Ethernet port 1  $\geq$  Ethernet port 2  $\geq$  Ethernet port 3  $\geq$  Ethernet port 4  $\geq$  ...  $\geq$  Ethernet port 16
- The quantity of cabinets loaded by each Ethernet port must be an integer multiple of the screen cabinet row quantity or column quantity.

## Operating Procedure

- Step 1 Click **Configuration** to enter the screen configuration page.
- Step 2 In the Screen Configuration area, select Quick.

- Step 3 Fill the numbers in the **Rows** and **Columns** text boxes according to the actual row and column quantities of the cabinets of the LED screen.

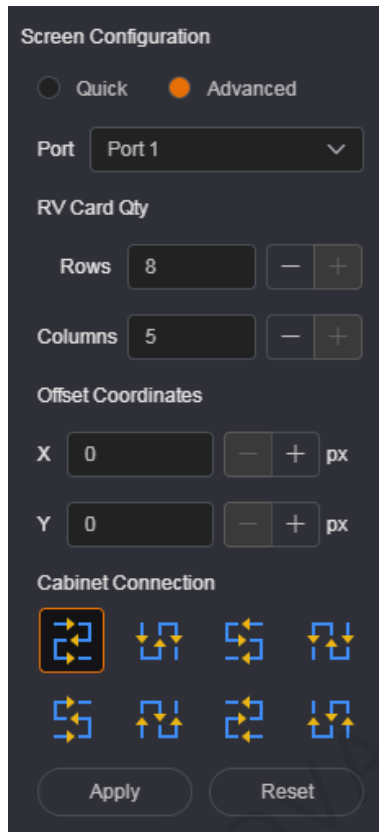

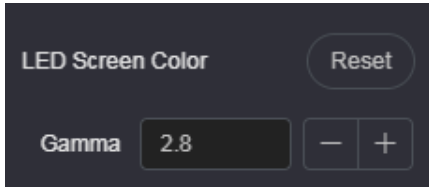

Figure 7-4 LED screen color adjustment

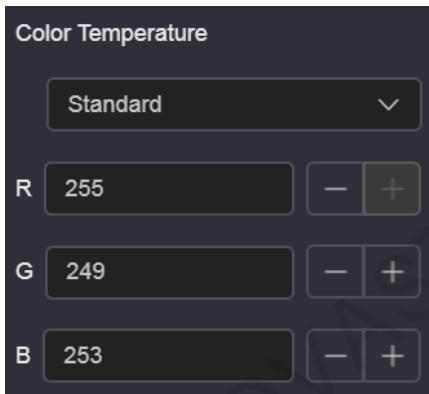

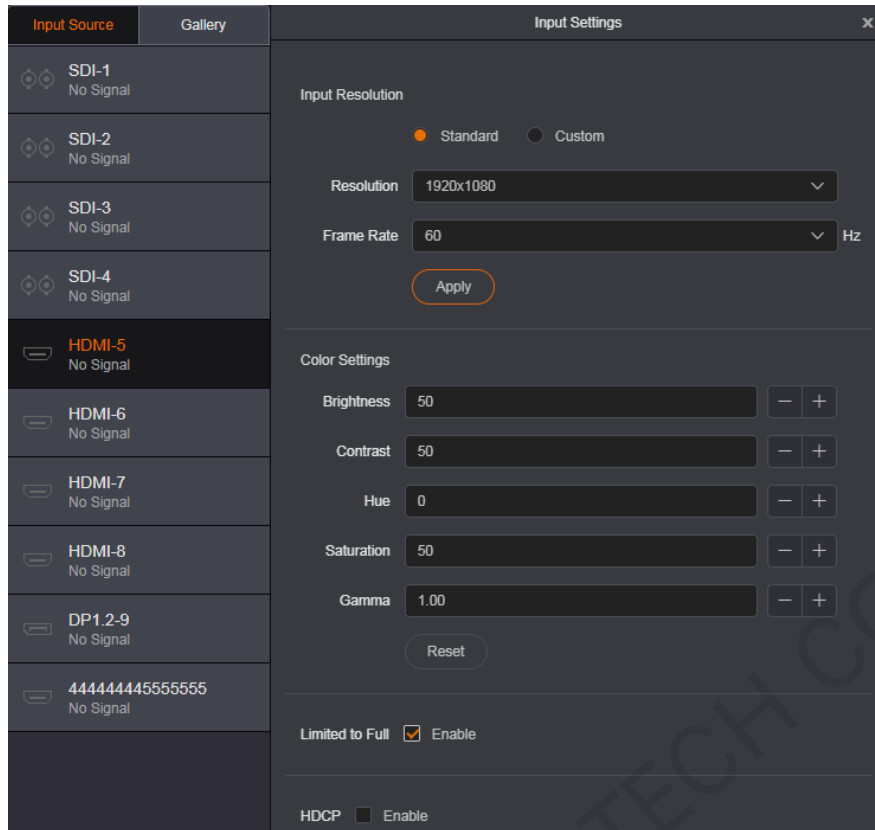

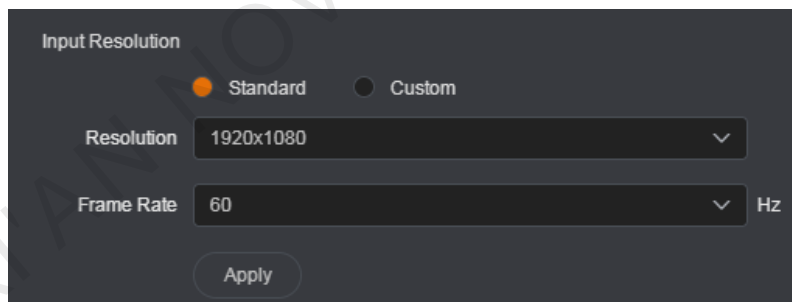

Each of the first two fields has minus and plus buttons for adjustment. At the bottom center is an "Apply" button.

- b. Enter a value in the **Width** text box.

- d. Select a frame rate from the drop-down list next to **Frame Rate**.

Step 4 Enable or disable the color range converting function for the input source.

Figure 7-10 Adding layers

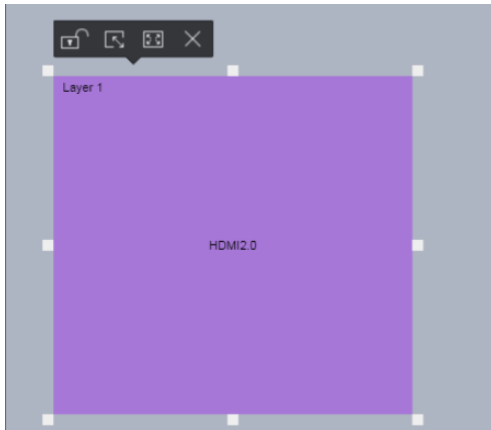







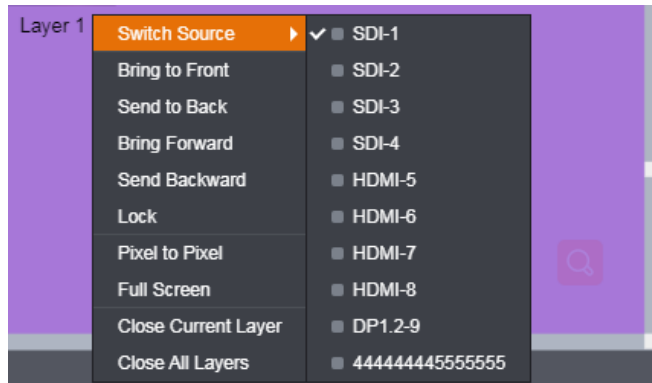

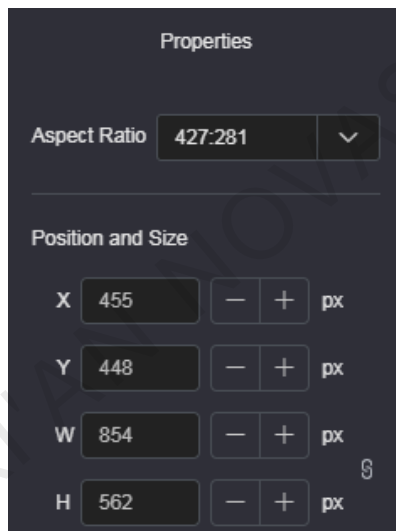

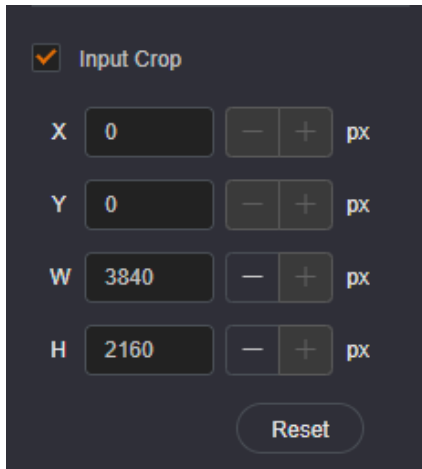

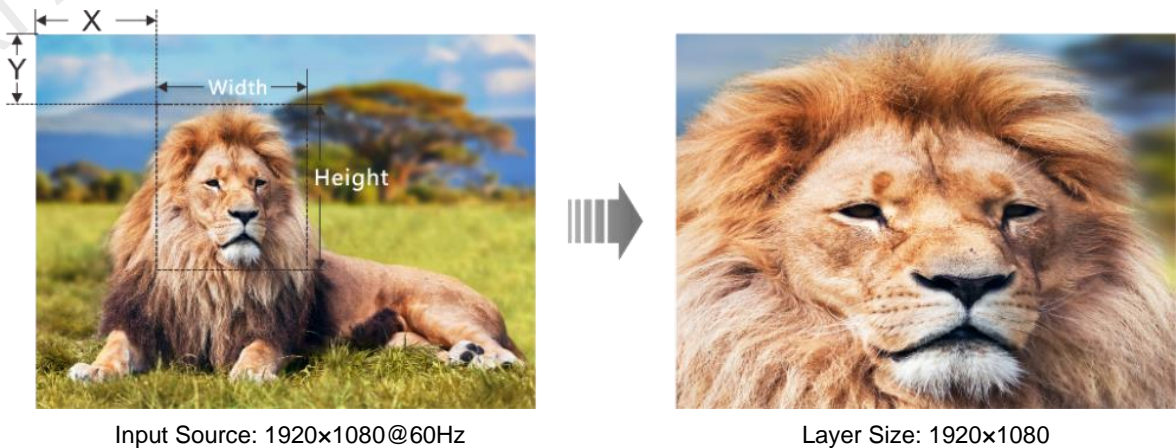
Figure 7-13 Input crop

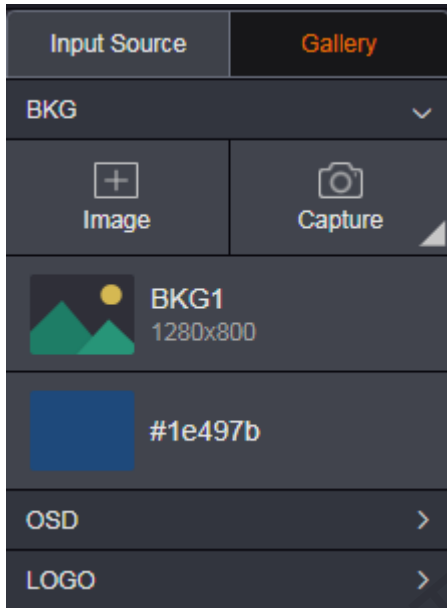

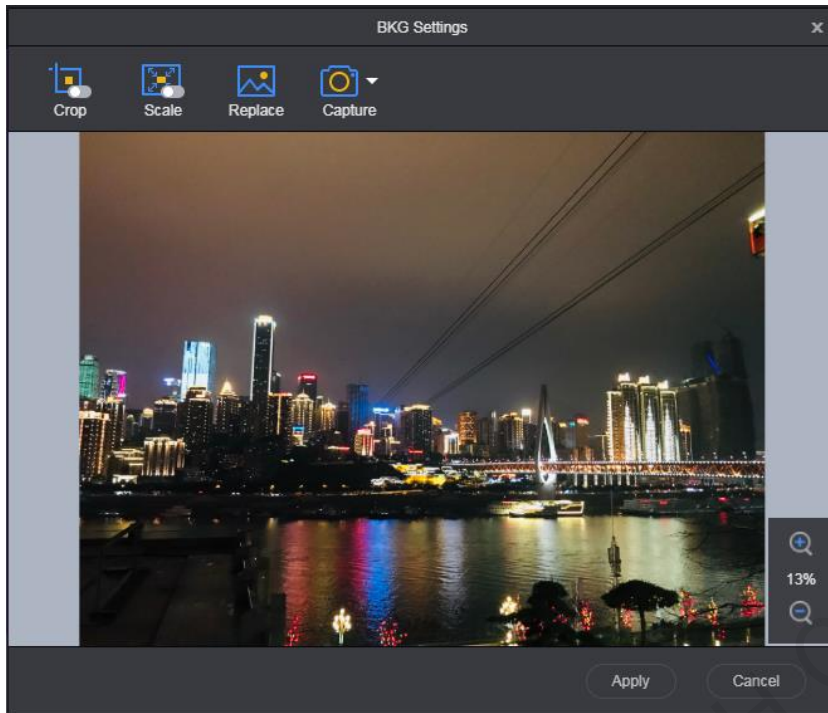

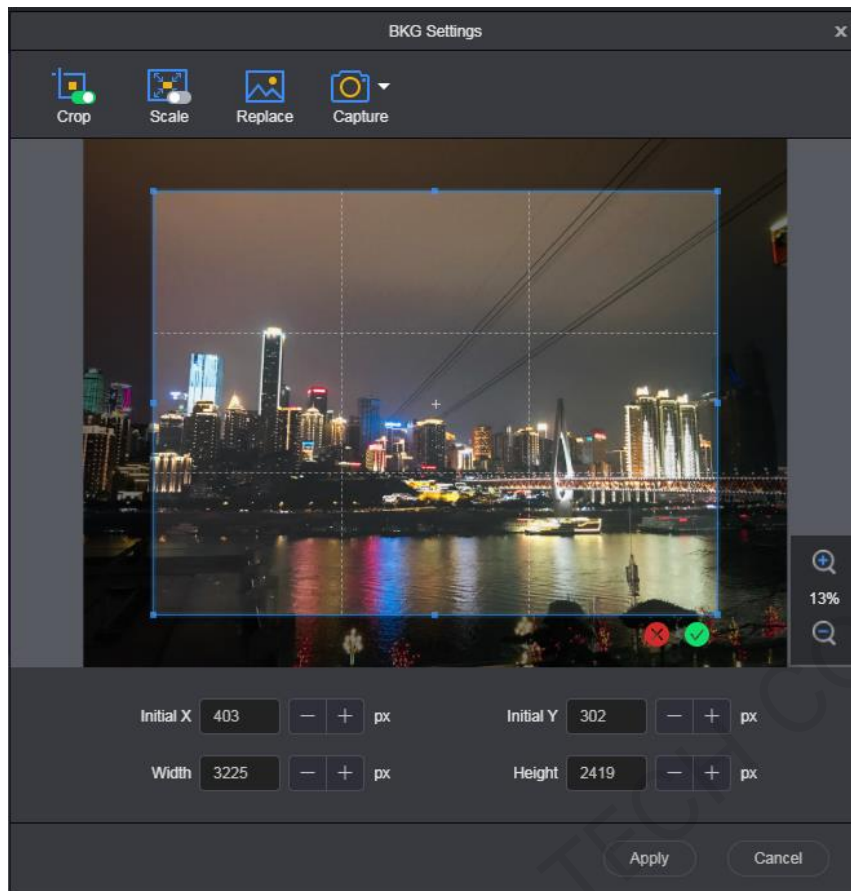
Figure 7-16 BKG settings



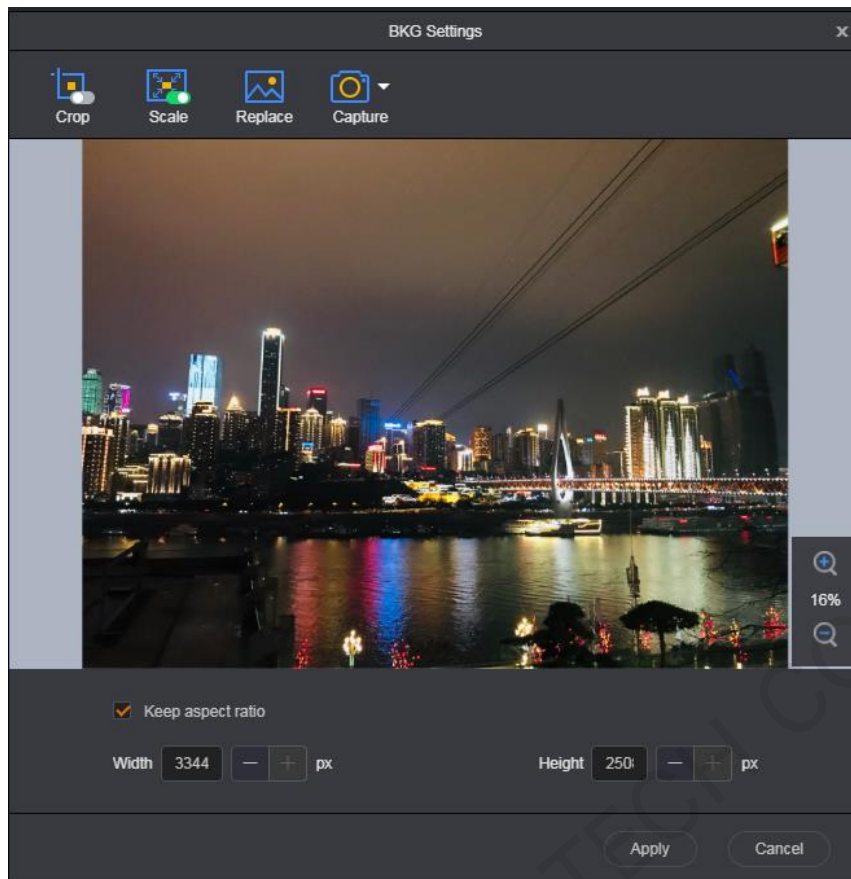

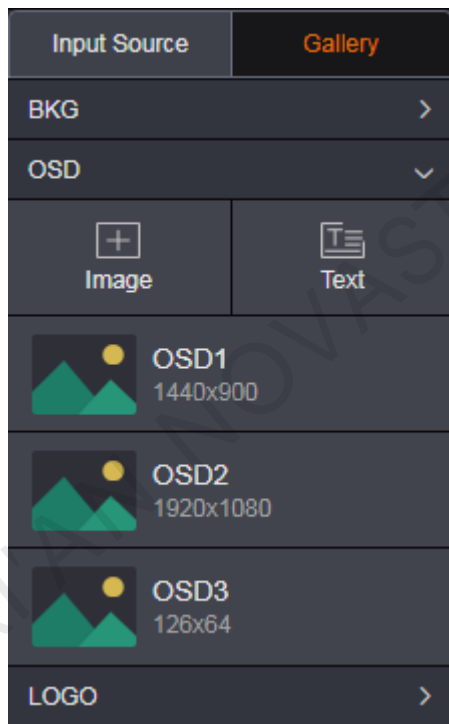

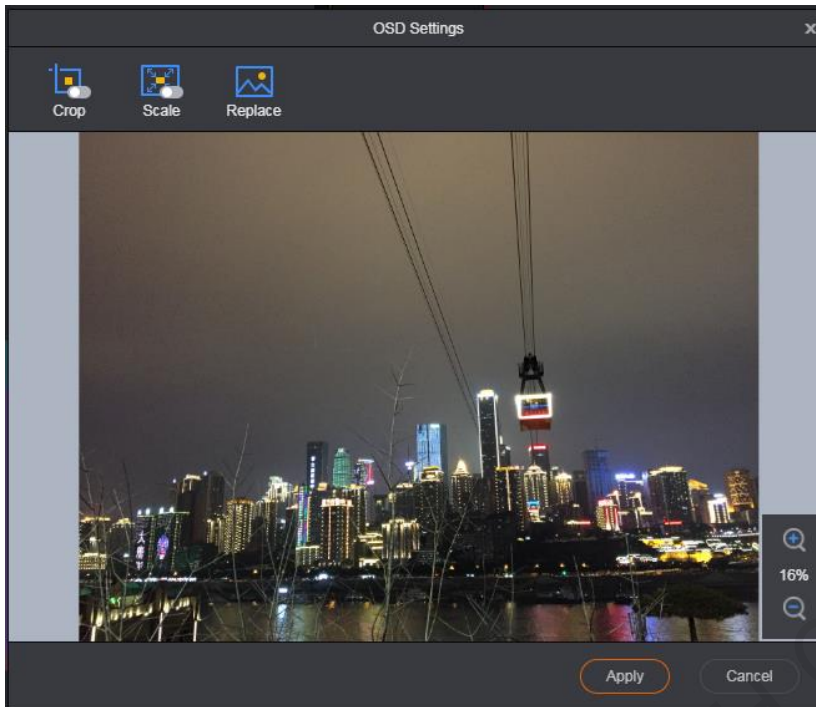
Figure 7-18 OSD list

Figure 7-19 OSD settings



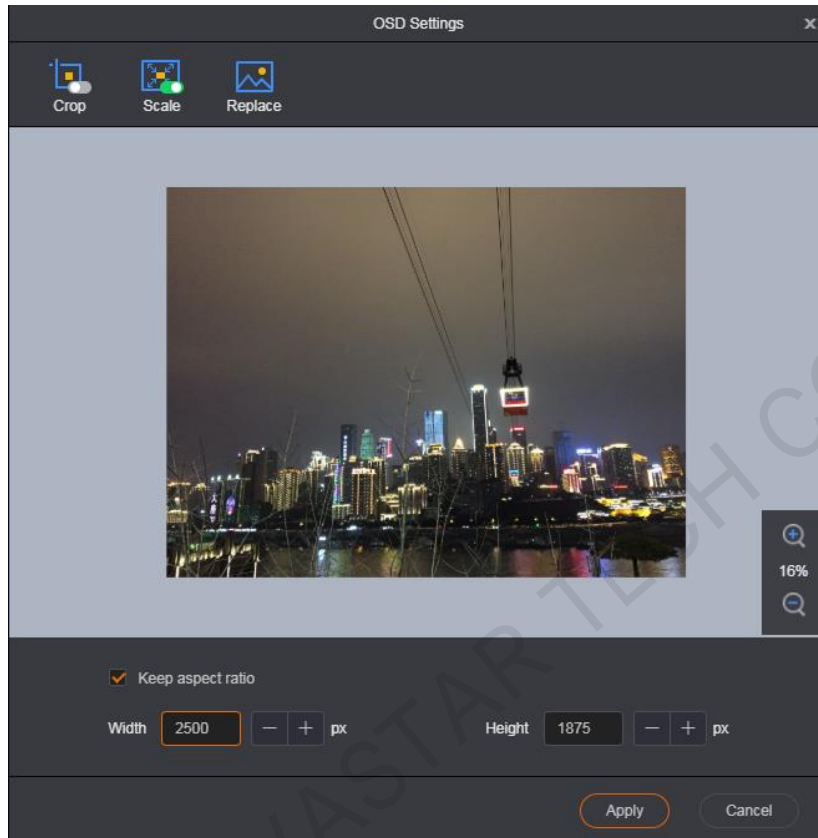

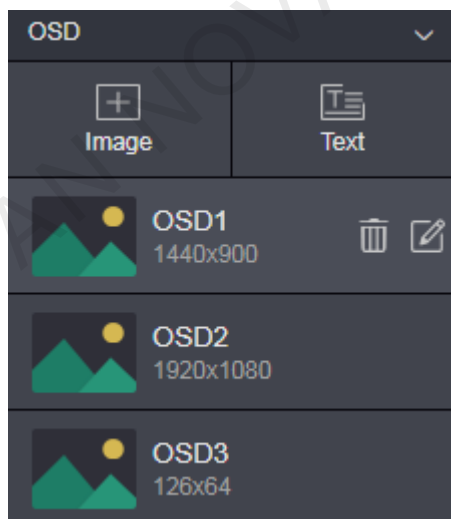

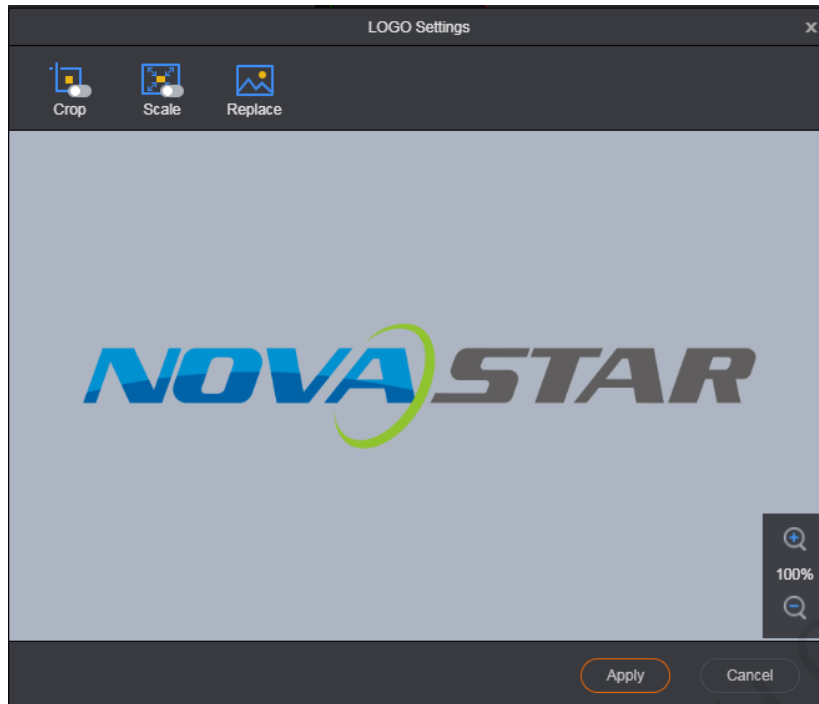
Figure 7-21 LOGO list

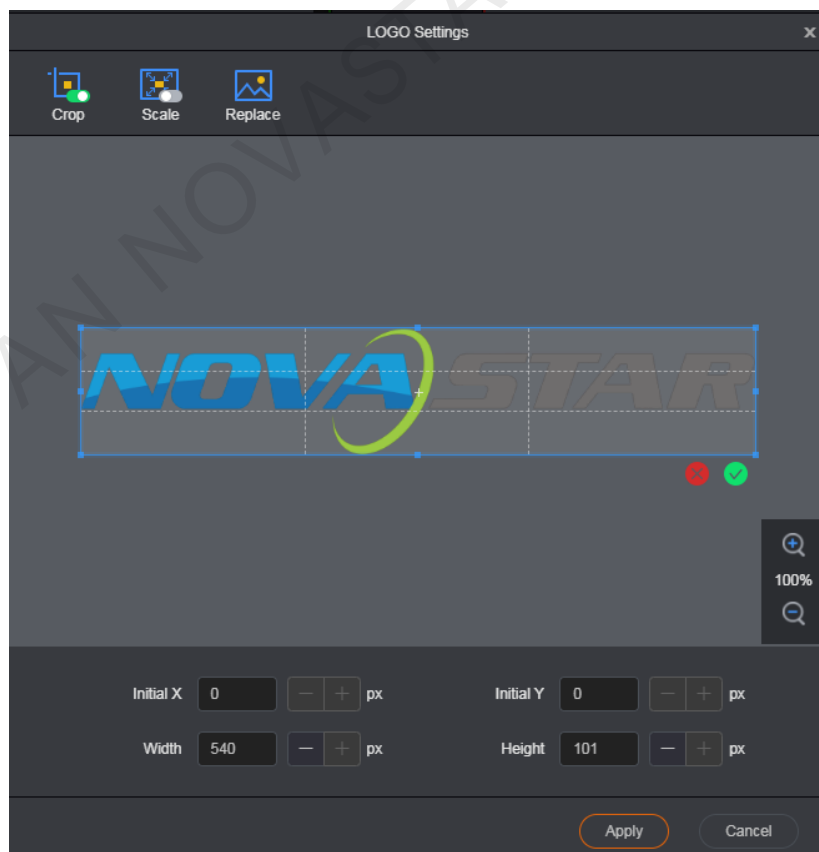
Figure 7-22 LOGO settings

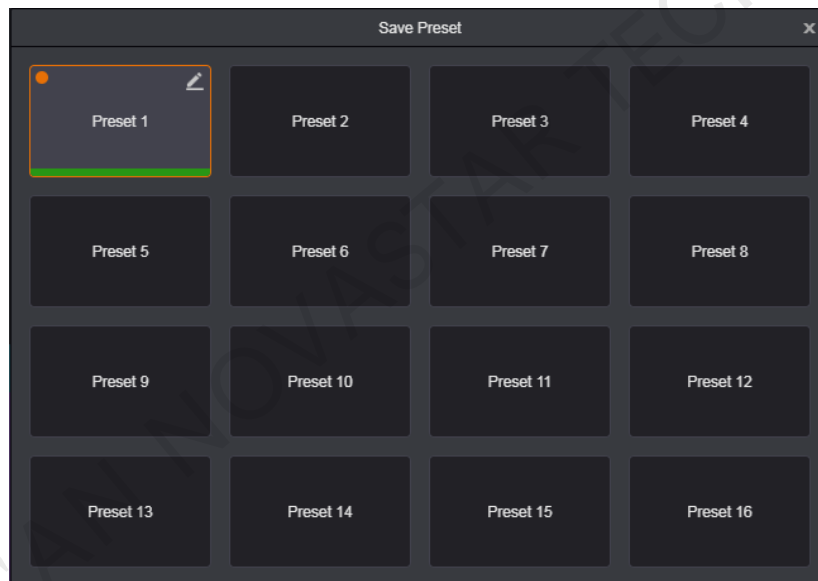
Figure 7-25 Saving presets

Figure 7-27 Connections for hot backup mode

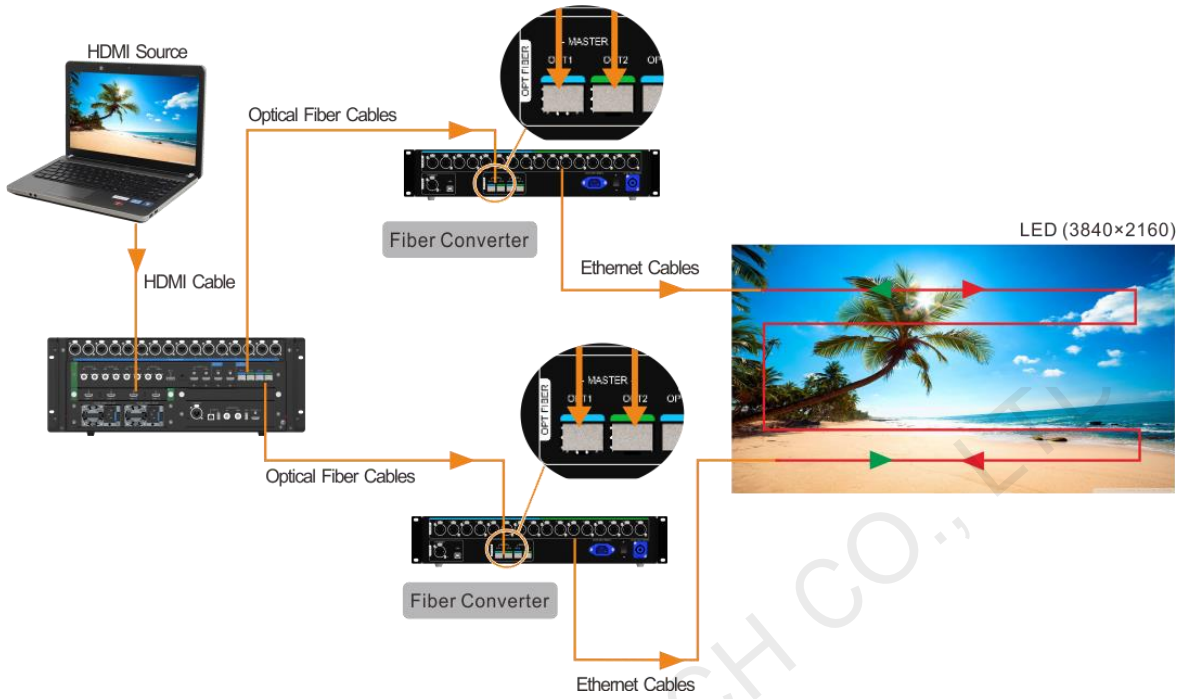
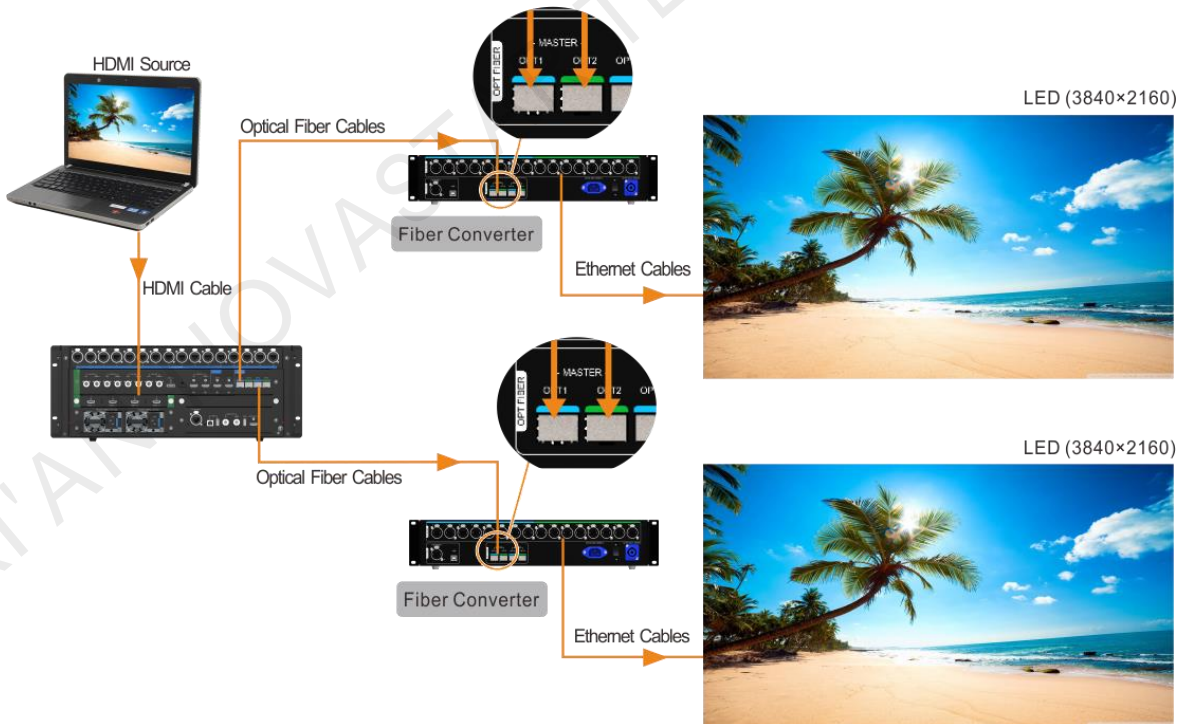


Figure 7-28 Connections for copy mode

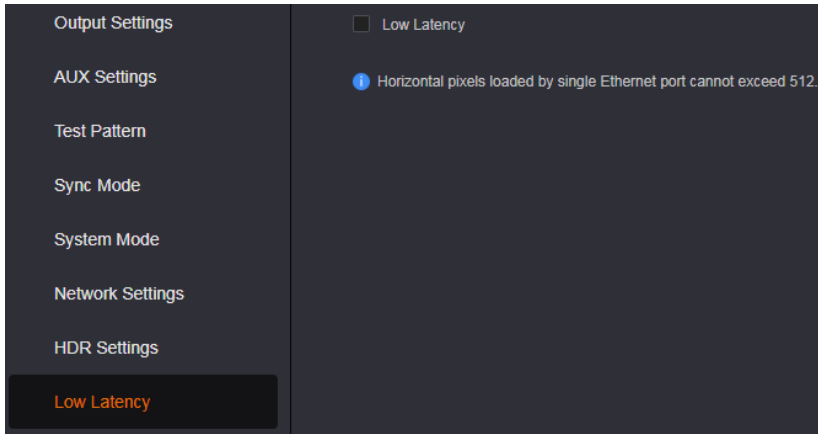
Figure 7-29 HDR settings

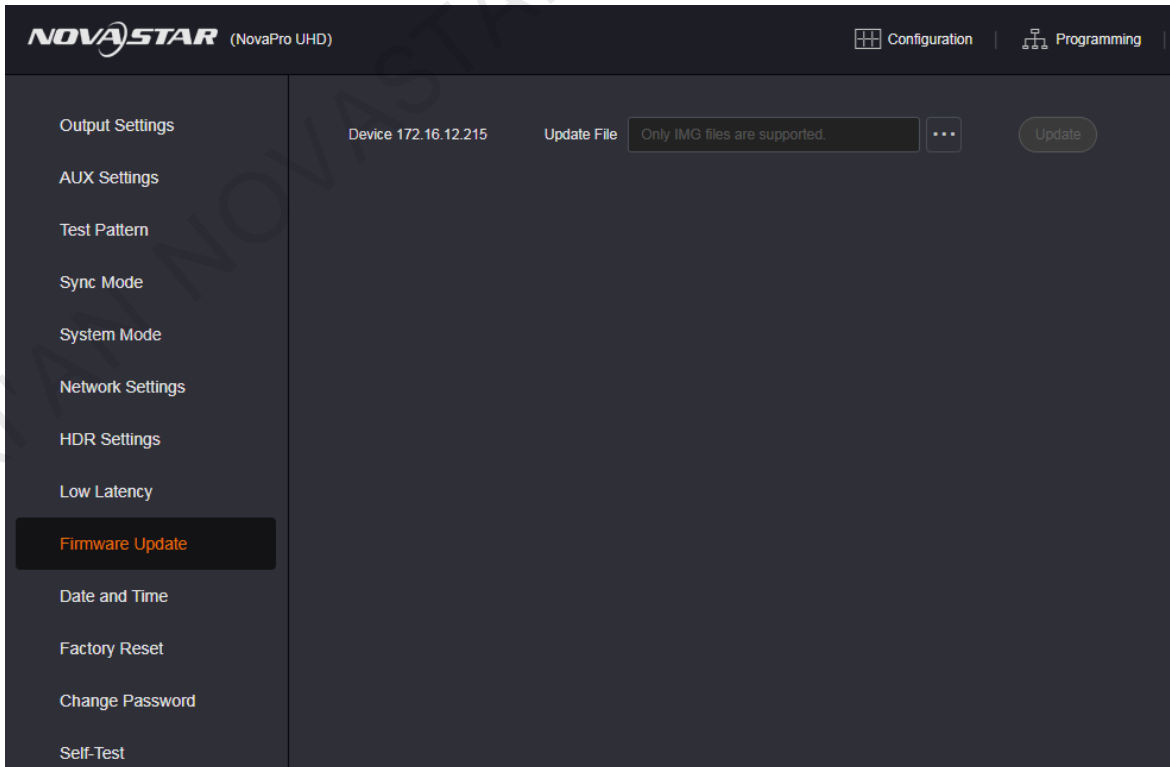

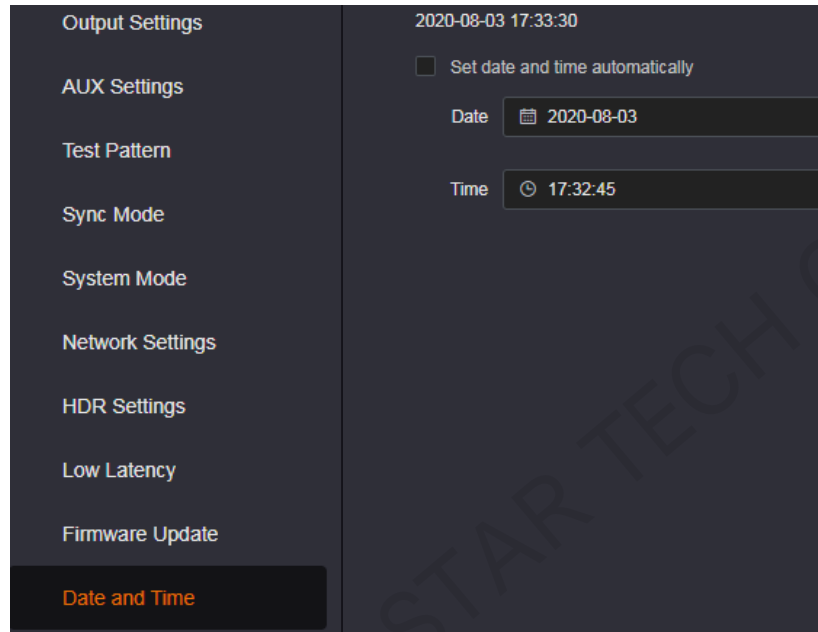

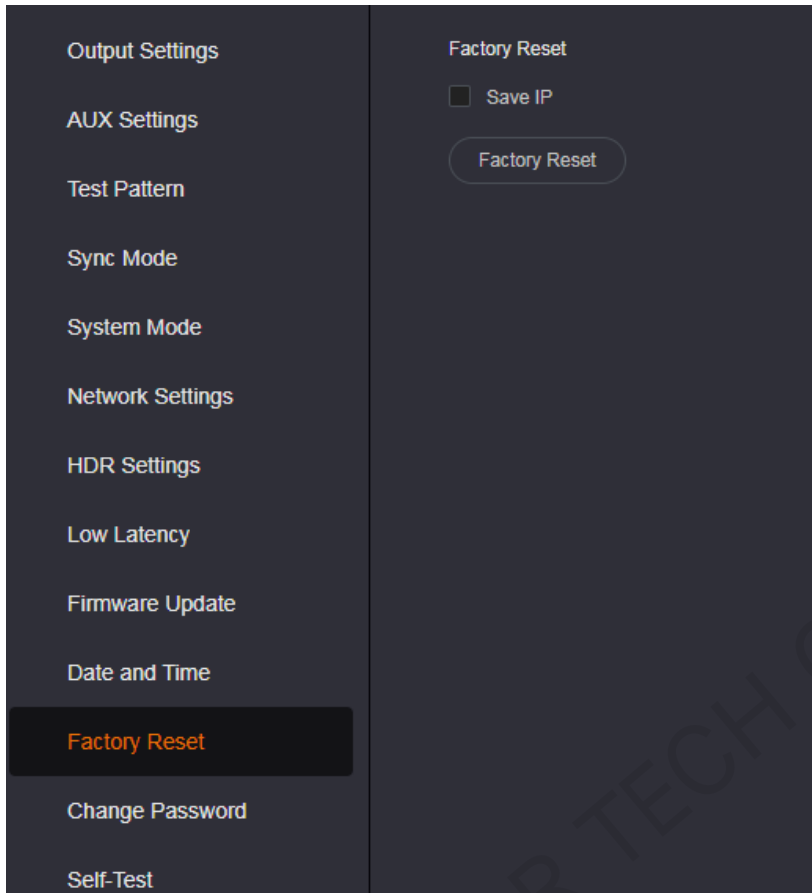
Figure 7-31 Date and time

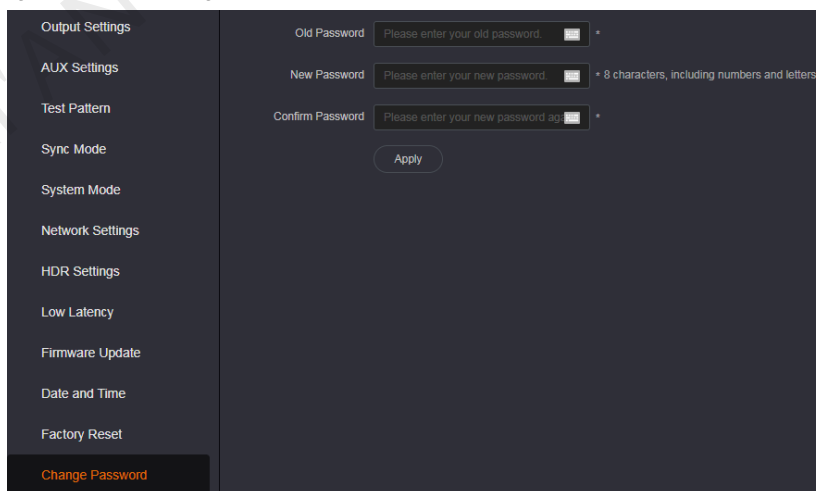
